Forty-six colleges and universities were represented at the fifth annual meeting of the American Association of Collegiate Registrars held last week in Richmond, Virginia, along with sessions of the National Education Association.

A feature was the address of Dr. S. P. Capen, of the United States Bureau of Education, who outlined ways in which the Bureau may cooperate with colleges and universi-

The program of the Registrars' meeting included papers by George W. Cram, Recorder of Harvard University; Professor Rudolph Tombo, of Columbia University Walter Humphreys, Registrar of the Massachusetts Institute of Technology; A. H. Espenshade, Registrar of Pennsylvania State College A. A. Mann, Registrar of New York State College of Agriculture, Cornell University; A. W. Tarbell Registrar of Carnegie Institute of Technology, and G. O. Foster, Registrar of the University of Kan-

Sectional meetings were held of the groups representing state universities, technological schools small colleges, agricultural colleges and endowed institutions.
