The University of Iowa will construct a club house costing over \$10,000 as a memorial to James J. Trickey, a former football star who represented that institution on the gridiron.

Two new schools have been added this year to the extension department of the University of Pennsylvania. They are evening schools of Finance and Commerce, and are located at Harrisburg, and Reading. The color rush and pole fight between the freshmen and sophomores of Washington and Jefferson college is no more. In place of these scraps, a push ball contest will be instituted between these two classes provided the arrangements now under way are carried through.

Vice president Marshall will address the students of West Virginia university on November 21st.

Haverford college is looking eagerly forward to one of the most important academic events ever experienced. In December, the American Archaeological association will meet there. The conference, which was held at Harvard last year, has chosen Haverford for this year's meeting in preference to the university of Chicago.

A fine write-up recently appeared in the Ursinus weekly on the Ursinus-State game. Among other things said was this "Our boys have only praise for the excellent treatment they received as guests of Penn State".
