

DR. STEINER ON IMMIGRATION

A Powerful Speaker Who Makes Deep Impression on His Hearers

Dr. Steiner highly pleased his Friday evening subject or the immigrant. The man appointed by President Roosevelt to study the immigration problem, Dr. Steiner is probably the best qualified man in America to speak upon this question. He believes that immigration is the most vital national question of the day, but that there is a solution which lies principally in the amalgamation of the races as they come to this country. "America is the greatest melting pot in the world"; all races are absorbed, and within a remarkably short time the immigrant is as truly American as if he had been born here.

Dr. Steiner made a tremendous appeal for better housing conditions, better food, and fair treatment for the immigrant who comes to America, and by hard and wearisome labor manages to support a large family, while the American people principally reap the benefits of his toil. The chapel services Sunday morning were addressed by Dr. Steiner. He preached a powerful sermon at 11:00 o'clock, even out doing himself, in earnestness and sincerity, in his lecture of the previous evening.
