GETTYSBURG TEAM CALLS A HALT

- Howard's Pitching Features Game Hits Few And Scattered. State's Field Work Erratic. Play Juniata Today.
- The Gettysburg nine last Saturday called a halt on Penn State's winning pace by taking the winning side of an interesting game. The steady, effective pitching of Howard, together with the poorly
- placed hitting and erratic fielding of the State players might serve to summarize the reasons for the loss of this game. States only run was scored in the
- second inning when Robinson doubled to left field, and soon afterward scored on a single by Kaunas. The succeeding innings found the Blue and White players unable to tally, although several times in rally they came close to

turning the game. The men were able to hit the ball, but found difficulty in doing so safely.

Hesselbacher opened his work on the mound by striking out three of the first six men to face him. His , pitching. although wild at times. was on the whole steady; and he netted at the close of the game, a total of 10 strike-outs. The work pitches-Hesselbacher. Time of gameof Kaunas around second base prevented a number of probable run-scoring hits.

The Gettysburg men played steady baseball throughout. They came here with a splendid record for the season, having been defeated only by the Princeton team, and exhibited a game which indicated effective coaching and thorough team work.
