

360 ARE GRADUATED

Penn State Sends Out Largest Class in Its History—Commencement Speaker Urges Active Political Careers on Seniors.

Three hundred and sixty young men and women were graduated with impressive ceremonies from the Pennsylvania State College. The fifty-fifth annual commencement exercises were held in the Schwab auditorium in the presence of more than eighteen hundred relatives of seniors, guests of the institution and college authorities.

H. Walton Mitchell, of Pittsburgh, who was graduated with the class of 1890 from Penn State, and is president of the board of trustees, gave the annual commencement address. He was the first State College alumnus accorded this honor.

During his remarks, Mr. Mitchell urged the graduating class to interest themselves and become active in all matters of our political life. He regretted that educated people have too often thought of our political affairs as side issues not worth their consideration, saying if there is one improvement we need more than any other in public affairs in America, it is to have men of strong minds and characters take their parts in our official life. He said that if the word politician had an unsavory sound it was partly because educated men of sense and judgment had failed to lift up the term.

Discussing the foreign wars, Mr. Mitchell expressed the belief that the tremendous cost of the current international struggle must bring nations to a more economical and ethical way of settling their difficulties. He pointed to the relation between the United States and Canada, with the dividing line between them unguarded and unfortified as an example of what is possible in international dealings.

More than 500 graduates returned to their alma mater for alumni day, June 8. Class reunions were the magnets that attracted them, and dressed in their grotesque uniforms the old grads frolicked about the campus and village.

The Rev. N. M. Waters, of Brooklyn, N. Y., preached the baccalaureate sermon on Sunday, June 6.

Y. M. C. A. Worker in Trenches
F. N. D. Buchman, secretary of the Penn State Y. M. C. A., will spend the summer in Europe ministering to the spiritual needs of the troops in trenches and the injured men in hospitals. Mr. Buchman goes to the front, probably with the German army, at the request of Dr. John R. Mott, leader in student Y. M. C. A. work throughout the world. Flying squadrons of six men each will be organized by Mr. Buchman and these religious workers will be on the firing line, at second base camps and in hospitals until the American colleges reopen in the fall.

NEW COURSES ADDED TO SUMMER SESSION PROGRAM

Nine courses never before offered during the summer session have been added to the curriculum at the Pennsylvania State College.

Penn State's summer session, designed primarily for teachers in the State's public schools, provides studies to meet the needs of teachers in all lines of work, and especially the scientific lines of agriculture, home economics, manual training, public school drawing and the sciences.

A new course in agriculture will be conducted by Professor L. H. Dennis, of the State department of public instruction, an expert in agricultural education. Miss Sara Lovejoy, director of the department of home economics of the State College, will offer courses in textiles and garment making. Six other experts will conduct thirteen other courses in this subject.

Other new courses will be given in rural education and school hygiene, geology, a teachers' course in Latin, in psychology, graduate study, religious instruction and in physical education. Miss Mary W. Hinman, of Chicago, will be in charge of pageantry and folk dancing.

COLLEGE WANTS PERMANENT INCOME FROM LEGISLATURE

In his annual statement to the board of trustees, President Sparks, of the Pennsylvania State College, described the predicament in which the college finds itself through the failure of the legislature to make appropriation for new buildings. He estimated that at least 500 students would be refused admission in the next two years for lack of classroom and laboratory space. His appeal to the audience to insist upon Pennsylvania providing a permanent source of income for the college of the State as is done in nearly thirty States in the Union was enthusiastically applauded by the commencement guests.

AGRICULTURAL EXPERT HERE

Professor L. H. Dennis, State Authority, Conducts Summer Course for Teachers—Designed for Advanced Pupils.

During the six weeks' summer session for teachers at the Pennsylvania State College, a course will be given in elementary and secondary agriculture for teachers of country schools. This course will also be offered to high school teaching this subject.

There will be laboratory work and daily recitations throughout the session. The course is designed to give work best adapted to high school pupils and more mature students in the seventh and eight years of the county schools.

A course in rural education, including organization, administration, elementary agriculture, nature study, and hand work will also be given. In this work the regular college staff will be assisted by Professor L. H. Dennis, expert in agricultural education of the State Department of Public Instruction.

Considerable attention will be given to the social questions of the country schools, playgrounds, organizations, community work, and the general program of activities. Students who have had some training in elementary and secondary agriculture will be admitted to advanced courses in animal husbandry, horticulture and agronomy for which college credit is given.
