

ANNUAL PICNIC PLANS

Summer Session's Annual Pilgrimage to Pine Grove Mills Scheduled for Next Saturday—Diversified Program Arranged.

The annual summer session picnic will be held at Pine Grove Mills Saturday, July 24. Trains will leave the railroad station at State College at 8:00, 9:00, and 10:00 o'clock. Returning, leave Pine Grove Mills at 3:45 and 4:30 o'clock. The 8:00 o'clock train will be used especially by persons desiring to join the excursions.

Round trip railroad tickets, including coupons for dinners, will cost fifty cents. They will be on sale Friday, July 23, until five o'clock and on Saturday morning at the station. Students are requested to buy tickets early so as to avoid crowding around the ticket window Saturday morning.

The college dinner will consist of sandwiches, eggs, pickles, fruit, ice cream, cakes and lemonade. Persons desiring to furnish their own dinners can purchase round trip railroad tickets without dinner coupons, for twenty-five cents, and those not going by train can purchase dinner tickets on the grounds for twenty-five cents.

The picnic grounds are located about ten minutes walk from the Pine Grove Mills station. Plenty of pure drinking water on the grounds.

The schedule of events for the day follows:

8:00 a. m.:—Leave Bellefonte Central station for the following excursions:

Geological excursion led by Dr Roddy.

Botanical excursion led by Profs. Bechtel and Kelly.

Insect excursion led by Profs. Eddy and Hess.

Forestry excursion led by Prof. Green.

Hike led by Mr. Lewis.

In so far as practical, these excursions will go to the top of the mountain and will return to the picnic grounds in time for dinner.

11:00 a. m.:—Games in charge of Mr. Lewis.

12:00 noon:—Dinner.

2:00 p. m.:—Stories by the Misses Illman.

2:30 p. m.:—Dancing in charge of Miss Hinman.

3:30 p. m.:—Stunts in charge of Profs. Torrence and Lewis.

In case of rain on Saturday, the picnic will be held on Monday and all Monday classes will be held on Saturday.

When the summer session was started six years ago it was supposed that the unusual limitation of admitting teachers only would keep the enrollment small. It is the only school in the United States on this basis; yet it has grown steadily until it is now probably the largest summer school in this State and is surpassed by few in any State.

PENN STATE READY FOR 800 FRESHMEN NEXT SEPTEMBER

With the completion of five new buildings at the Pennsylvania State College during the last year, it is expected that the State institution will be able to accommodate 800 freshmen next fall. More than 240 applicants were rejected in September because of inadequate facilities for proper instruction. Cramped quarters in all departments necessitated immediate extension, and new buildings were erected for the schools of agriculture, liberal arts, engineering, and for the women's building. Other buildings are now under construction for the department of chemistry, and the school of mines. They are rapidly approaching completion.

Brashear Scholarships Awarded

From Pittsburgh and vicinity, the following scholarship students are attending the summer session: Miss Mary Frances Reahard, kindergarten instructor; Miss Millie Dahlon DuVall, a teacher in the eighth grade, who was also here last year; and Miss Sadie Elizabeth Baer, of the third grade in the Crafton schools. Scholarships were awarded these teachers on basis of their work as instructors in the public schools. They are now eligible to membership in the Bashear club, an organization named for the founder of the scholarships, who annually sends hundreds of young teachers to prominent American colleges during the summer months.

Western College President

is New Dean at Penn State

Dr. Thomas Charles Blaisdell, president of Alma college, at Alma, Michigan, has been elected dean of the school of liberal arts of the Pennsylvania State College. He succeeds Dr. Samuel E. Weber who vacated the position last year to become superintendent of public schools at Scranton. Dr. Blaisdell will enter upon his duties in September.

COLLEGE STUDIES AVIATION

Penn State Engineering Experts Investigate Plane Resistance; Government to Profit by Experiments.

The engineering experiment station at the Pennsylvania State College will cooperate with the United States government's new board of aviation to work for the development of the American aviation corps, and place it ahead of the sky-fighting machinery of the other nations. Experiments will be conducted here to measure the lifting power of the various sizes of planes.

Investigations along this line, began here four years ago, will be resumed by Dean Sackett and his assistants. They will continue and enlarge the experimental work after the value of the collected data has been determined.

Dr. Blaisdell, a native Pennsylvanian, holds degrees from Allegheny College, Syracuse University, University of Nebraska, and University of Pittsburgh. For ten years he was connected with the schools of Pittsburgh, and for six years was professor of English at Michigan Agricultural College. He has been three years in his present position. He is the author of several textbooks on English.

Several principals and superintendents have visited the college looking for teachers. There is an especially large demand for instructors in home economics and industrial education.
