HONOR SYSTEM TO BE OBSERVED IN ALL EXAMINATIONS

Honor Committee Requests Alternate Seating Arrangement

STUDENTS TO DECIDE

With the ending of the present semester one of the most important factors in the administration of student affairs at Penn State will again be brought to the attention of the college at large. The factor referred to is the honor system.

With regard to the actual operation of the honor system during the coming examinations the honor committee has made the suggestion that wherever it is possible students take alternate seats in the examination room.

Another point which the committee wishes to emphasize is that of signing the pledge at the conclusion of the examination. Wherever on the examination book, it should be written out in the form given in Article 1, section 3, of the honor system.

Definition of the Honor System. Section 1. This system shall be known as the Honor System of the Student Body of The Pennsylvania State College.

Section 2. Definitions of Violations. Any of the following acts shall be considered violations of the honor system, any attempt to receive dishonest assistance either before the examination or quiz begins or during its continuance from books, paper, or printed matter, written aids whatsoever, or from any person, or attempt to give dishonest assistance whether the one so doing has or has not completed his paper.

Section 3. The Pledge. Every student shall append to his quiz or examination paper a written declaration reading as follows: "I pledge my word of honor that in this exercise I have neither given or received dishonest assistance of any kind." (Signature.)

Section 4. Failure to Make Pledge. Any student who fails to place the pledge on his paper shall be notified. If he then refuses to make the pledge, he shall be reported by the examiner for investigation to the honor committee. If he still refuses to sign, his refusal shall be taken as direct evidence of dishonesty and he will be punished as hereinafter described.

Section 5. If a student detects any apparent dishonesty in a quiz or examination, he shall at once quietly inform the offending party of the detection. Should the offender persist the attention of at least one other persons shall be called to this matter, and then the case shall be carried to the honor committee which shall conduct an investigation into the same.

Section 6. Powers of the Faculty. A student's finished examination paper which gives evidence of dishonest work shall be turned over by the faculty member receiving it to the honor committee for investigation.

Section 7. Student Board members will be ineligible for election to membership on the committee.

Section 8. At least one of the members so elected by the Student Council shall have been a member of the honor committee during the previous year.

Section 9. Meetings. Immediately upon the presentation of a charge against any student lodged with any member of the honor committee, the chairman, or his representative, shall call a meeting of the committee and investigate the charge.

Section 10. The name of the accuser shall be known to the honor committee only.

Section 11. Trials. It shall be the duty of the honor committee to conduct investigations and trials of all students accused of dishonesty in examinations of quizzes.

Section 12. Evidence. The Honor committee shall summon before it any student charged with dishonesty; shall state to the accused the charge against him; shall gather information from witnesses; and shall give the accused an opportunity for defense.

Section 13. The accused shall have the privilege of engaging counsel for himself and right to call witnesses in his favor.

Section 14. As far as possible all evidence obtained by the committee shall be known only to the committee.

Section 15. The name of the accused shall be known to the honor committee and conviction when it shall be given to the President of the College, or his representative.

Section 16. Conviction. The honor committee shall declare guilty any student against whom, in their judgement, sufficient evidence has been brought.

Section 17. A unanimous vote of the committee shall be necessary to convict.

Section 18. Punishment. For the first conviction of dishonesty the convicted shall be suspended from the college for one year with privilege of returning according to the regulations of the college, at the beginning of the corresponding semester in which he was suspended.

Section 19. Upon a second conviction a student shall be permanently dropped from college.

Section 20. The adoption of these articles shall require a majority vote of the Student Body.

Section 21. After the adoption of these articles, a three-fourths vote of those assembled in a mass meeting of the Student Body shall be required to amend them, providing at least two weeks notice of such amendment is presented in writing at a regular mass-meeting.

Section 22. These articles may be abolished by actions of the faculty alone in their regular meeting after one month's notice to students and faculty, or by a three-fourths vote of the mass-meeting consisting of two-thirds of the regular enrolled students of the college after at least one month's public notice of such meeting.

Section 23. Every student shall append to his quiz or examination paper a written declaration reading as follows: "I pledge my word of honor that in this exercise I have neither given or received dishonest assistance of any kind." (Signature.)

Section 24. Failure to Make Pledge. Any student who fails to place the pledge on his paper shall be notified. If he then refuses to make the pledge, he shall be reported by the examiner for investigation to the honor committee. If he still refuses to sign, his refusal shall be taken as direct evidence of dishonesty and he will be punished as hereinafter described.
