**PLAN IMPROVEMENTS FOR BOROUGHS STREETS**

Action taken by the Town Council at their regular meeting seems to hold promise that at last the Borough will be provided with better streets. This is to be found in the passage of a motion providing for the preparation by the Borough Engineer of plans and specifications with an estimate of the cost, for the carrying away of the surface water and the filling and oiling of the principal streets. Although it is not possible to proceed immediately with this work it will provide the officials with a definite plan which will assure well-paved, drained and oiled streets, with sidewalks of a uniform width and all laid to grade.

**STEEL BEST IN MINES**

The advantage of steel over wood in mine work, was discussed in detail by R. B. Woodworth at a meeting of the Mining Society last Wednesday evening.

Mr. Woodworth is a recognized expert in this line of work and has been with the Carnegie Steel Company for over twenty years. In his talk he showed why the steel is superior to wood and how it may be used in mine work. He also took up the matter of safety and the economic side of replacing the wooden supports by those of steel.

Two new courses will be thrown open to the residents of Pennsylvania during the regular session of the summer school. The first course deals with the training of teachers for continuation school work and the second is a short period of training for church workers. The training of teachers for continuation work has been necessitated by the Cox Child Labor Act of 1915, which requires every child under 16 years of age who is employed in a shop, to take eight hours per week of school work. The new course will prepare teachers for this special class of vocational instruction.
