LETTER RECEIVED FROM
STATE MAN IN ARMY

The following is an extract from a
letter received recently from a promi-
nent member of the 1917 class, who is
now in camp:
"The big Y. M. C. A. tent here is
popular with the men. The chief at-
traction is the tables with pen and
ink. It is virtually impossible to write
a letter in the tents. There is noth-
ing in them but cots. The soldiers
appreciate the comforts of the associa-
tion and have nothing but good will
for their secretaries. I have heard
several comments, all favorable, pass-
ed by the roughest men in our com-
pany upon the 'Y.'—For the private

soldier there is the meagerest of plain
fare doled out in rations, the drudgery
of washing one's own clothes with no
other implement than an eight quart
bucket; and worst of all to a man of
any intelligence at all, the constant
subjection to ignorance and often un-
just "non-coms" and the constant
forced association with no chance of
privacy whatever with the few
mouthed men.

Changes About the Campus
Few changes about the college cam-
pus greet the eye of the returning stu-
dent. Most of the improvements have
been limited to the rebuilding of
roads and paths. A number of brick
crossings have been eliminated, the
improved condition of the roads mak-
ing them unnecessary. A small frame
building just south of the wireless
tower, which was erected for tem-
porary use by the engineering school,
is the only improvement in the build-
ing line.
