LIBERAL ARTS SCHOOL TO ENFORCE CUT SYSTEM

The following rules governing "cuts" in classes of the School of Liberal Arts should be of interest to all students taking work in that school.

To the faculty of the school of the Liberal Arts.

Your committee to investigate methods of excusing absences respectfully submits the following report:

I. That the rule of the freshman advisers to the effect that, when a student is absent three consecutive times from his classes, he shall be made to apply to the three other classes.

If that the words "are held accountable" in Rule 5 of the Regulations Affecting Students (1916 edition) should be interpreted as follows: (a) If a student is absent without sufficient cause, he shall be given a zero grade for the course missed, but he shall be responsible in making up examinations for work missed, (b) If, in the judgment of the instructor, the student had adequate cause for his absence, he shall be allowed to make up the work missed during the period absent. Failure to make up such work, the student shall be given a zero grade.

III That it be made clear that the former rule of the college that students are allowed as many "cuts" in a course as there are credits in that course, is not now in force.

SPECIAL ORDINANCE COURSE FOR STUDENTS

The Engineering School announces the opening of an Ordinance Course for one hour per week, under the direction of J. O. Keller. This course will be open to students of the college from any school, and will be carried in conjunction with the regular college work.

The class met last Friday evening in the Engineering clubroom to organize, but there will be an opportunity for others to enroll by seeing Mr. Keller. The course will continue for the balance of the semester, and already a large number have signified their intention of taking the work.

Those now taking any other war courses are not eligible to carry this course, from other schools besides Engineering, will be allowed to do so by presenting a note signed by their dean. Only students in good standing are allowed to sign up for the course.

ARCHITECTURAL SOCIETY HEARS INTERESTING TALKS
