PRESENT TENSE

Savoir—to know (a thing) Connaître—to know (a person)

Je sais, Tu sais, Il sait, Vous savez, Vous savez, Il savent, Connais, Connaissez, Connaissez, Connaissez

Note 1 "savoir" also means "to know how to," when used with a following infinitive

Note 2 Verbs of motion like aller, "to go," envoyer, "to send," and venir, "to come" together with verbs expressing some activity like voler, "to see" and entendre, "to hear," are followed by the infinitive directly

Je sais parler français—I know how to speak French Venez me voir—Come (and) see me L'entendez-vous venir?—do you hear him coming?

Connaissez-vous cet homme?—Do you know (are you acquainted with) this man? Le corps—the body La tête—the head L'oreille (fem.)—the ear Le nez—the nose L'œil—the eye (pl. les yeux) La bouche—the mouth Les cheveux—the hair (on the human head)
