Freshmen Elect For Next Year

At their last class meeting for the current year, the members of the class of 1921 chose officers to serve during 1918-19. In addition to being one of the most important meetings of the year, it was also one of the smallest, only some two hundred men being present to cast their ballots. W. C. Gehring was elected president of the class for next year.

The other officers elected were: vice president, J. B. Demming, secretary, E. L. M. Garman, and treasurer, N. R. Korb. Including the men who were elected the five men who survived the eliminations for each office were: For president, Gehring, Demming, Kieger, Roberts and Fairley; for secretary, Garman, Bowman, Hamerman, Spaeth and Hoerner; and for treasurer, Korb, Knapp, Dumbly, Estley and Trout.

The class of 1921 went on record as having officially broken a precedent custom by voting to tolerate no feeling of stores in the borough following the shedding of the "shakes" last Saturday. The class also took a decided stand on the movie question by voting to adopt the resolutions drawn up by the Senior Class and presented to the Freshmen by R. K. Cochrane '18.

The Freshman team was coached by "Bill" Martin, in the absence of "Dutch" Herman, and they won every game in which they competed except the Pitt Fresh game which resulted in a tie. Such teams as Kiskadee, Wyoming Seminary, Bellefonte Academy and other

strong teams fell before the Yeallings. The Freshmen have a clean record for the three years in which the one-year rule has been in effect. The scrum game between the Freshmen and Sophomores resulted in a tie, the same as in the past two years.

Track Team Does Well

Couch Martin suffered a great handicap with the loss of such men as Rinnvan, Shields, Shanon, Matling, Beck, Cabbage, O'Donnell, Jones, as well as many other cinder stars. However, the Blue and White has not competed in many meets this year and Intercollegiate matches were practically the limit of State's track activities. They competed in the Meadowbrook and Ganerweller and Demming came through with flying colors. In every event in which the Nittany institution had men entered, a satisfactory showing was made. A representation of the Blue and White will travel to the Penn Relays next week and at this time a better estimate of the worth of the team may be obtained.

Case Men Victorious

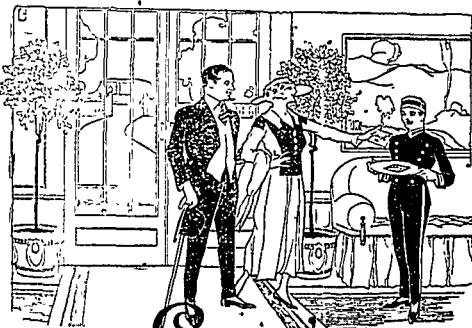
The basketball team proved no exception to the rule and in this sport Adams, the Blue and White center, was found among the winners at the opening of college, while some were lost by graduation. Captain Blakeslee assumed the task of coaching the team and Mullan, Wolfe and Young were called upon to fill the vacancies in the outfit. The five had one of the most successful seasons that a Penn State team has ever had, and victories were registered over such outfits as Lehigh, Colgate, Carlisle Indians, Pittsburg, Carnegie Tech and West Virginia. Eleven victories were gained by the Blue and White.

Wrestlers Are Champions

In the mat game Penn State again sprang to the front and retained a big lead all through the year, defeating all her opponents. The Navy proved to be the only strong opposition for the Blue and White, but they fell by a score of 16 to 14 before State's grapplers. Cornell suffered defeat twice, and Lehigh also went down before the onslaught of Captain Long's men. Coach Yeager had a big job on his hands at the opening of the wrestling season, with such men as Mills, Higgins and Smoley in service. Deane was called upon to fill the gap made vacant by the graduation of Ostermeyer, Brown, Nelson and Horst came to the forefront in the other vacant weights. After winning four dual meets, the Nittany seven traveled to the Intercollegiate for the first time in the history of the institution and returned with six intercollegiate champions, the seventh, being forced to

forfeit because of an injury.

Baseball Season Abandoned

Penn State has confined this sport to interclass games and all of the classes have produced fast teams. "Doc" Wheeling has assumed the role of coach. In the absence of "Dick" Hales and he made rapid progress with the material on hand. Many of the "varsity" men in this sport also had entered the service and the Freshmen again were called upon to fill the gaps. Manager Allison arranged a schedule of three games, but the first with Dickinson had to be called off because of weather conditions. The "varsity" team will be seen in action during the early part of next week if weather conditions permit, and Carnegie Tech will be one of the opponents. Johnson, Munkle and Wheeling

compose the backbone of the team.

Soccer Team Wins

This sport has been played on a limited scale because of the financial condition for minor sports, and only two independent games were played, State being the victor in both of these. Interclass soccer has taken a prominent part on the sports schedule for the past year. Lacrosse has been confined entirely to interclass games and the "varsity" was not seen in action this year.
