#### EDITORIAL ANNOUNCEMENT

For the third year, the SUMMER COLLEGIAN, a weekly newspaper of six issues, will be published under the auspices of the Pennsylvania State College during the summer session for teachers. This publication is the official newspaper of the summer school session and has the approval and support of the college authorities. It is supported by private interests who are bearing the financial uncertainties of the enterprise.

The SUMMER COLLEGIAN was first published in 1915, and was continued in 1916. Both times, however, it proved to be a losing proposition both in time and money; for that reason it was not published last year. This year, however, because the college was doing more than it has ever done before, the need of a SUMMER COLLEGIAN was again felt. In fact, it may be well here to enumerate some of the events which will or are, taking place during this special war-time summer of the Pennsylvania State College: Summer Session for Teachers; State Summer School for Continuation School Teachers; Summer School for Library Workers; 400 U. S. Army men here for special industrial training; National Military Training Camp; Ten-day Conference of Country Church Workers; Two-day Conference of County and City Superintendents; Summer Session in Industrial Organization and Management.

The Collegian will be conducted on practically the same lines as it was conducted in previous years. One important change, however, has been made. That is, it has been made an all-college publication. By this, in addition to covering all the news of the summer session, every department of the college is fully covered. In this way, the teachers may know what Penn State as a whole is accomplishing, and the other subscribers may know what the teachers are doing.

## 350 ARMY MEN BEING TRAINED AT PENN STATE

### Enlisted Men From Pennsylvania And Maryland Receiving Special Industrial Instruction

Approximately 300 enlisted men of the United States army are receiving special training along industrial lines in the engineering laboratories of the Pennsylvania State College. About 150, sent here from Maryland, are being instructed in the Stock Pavilion on Ag Hill, as motor truck drivers and mechanics, and about 200, sent from various counties of Pennsylvania, are receiving instruction as electricians, blacksmiths, carpenters and machine shop men in the engineering building. Every man is of draft age and has been sent to State College through his local board.

The first detachment to arrive here for training was a contingent from Minnesota, 189 in number, coming here early in April; these received the same training which the Pennsylvania boys are now getting. The Maryland detachment did not arrive until the middle of May. As the period of training is but eight weeks, the Minnesota detachment left about June 15th, for Camp Leach, D. C., from where they will be shortly sent to France. The Maryland boys who are scheduled to leave within the next ten days will go where they are most needed. Another contingent to take their place is due to arrive about July 15th. Captain "Budd" Whitney, one of Penn State's former football coaches, was here Tuesday and signed up the college to train this class in motor truck driving and repair work.

The detachment is roomed in Old Main Building and fed in McAllister Hall. It is under the command of the following officers: commanding officer, Capt. William P. Murray, Inf., R. C.; acting adjutant, 2nd Lieut. Lawrence O. Griffith, Inf., R. C.; company officers, 1st Lieut. Charles A. Smith, Jr., Inf., R. C., 1st Lieut. Andrew J. Whinery, F. A., R. C., and 1st Lieut. Arthur B. Scott, Inf., N. A.; quartermaster, 2nd Lieut. Thomas H. Joyce, QMC, N. A.

The instruction of the men is in charge of members of the engineering faculty, while the officers take care of the military end. On Saturday, the classes close at 12 m. and the men are off until ten o'clock. Passes are also granted to a certain number from 12 m. Saturday until Sunday evening. Nine of the Maryland boys left Tuesday morning, having completed their course in advance of the others. They have been sent to the 79th Division, Camp Meade, Md. Every man who completes his course is given a certificate, on which he is given credit for the amount and the quality of work he has done.

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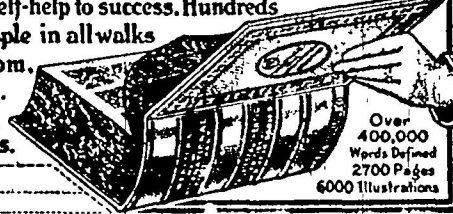
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
