

TEN-DAY COURSE IN CANNING BEING HELD

A special class consisting of fifty-four women, sent to the college by the Woman's Emergency Aid Committee of the Council of National Defense of Pennsylvania, arrived at Penn State on Monday for a ten-day short course in canning, drying, and preserving of fruits and vegetables. This course was considered necessary on account of the extreme food shortage in our country, and because it is absolutely essential to winning the war to conserve a large part of the food stuffs which go to waste annually. These women who are taking this course come from various sections of the state, and when they complete their work here they will return to their home communities and act as instructors to the women there. The course is being given in the domestic science laboratory, and is under the charge of Mrs. William Kellogg, and Miss Effie Keller.

The U. S. Government. The following regulations will be enforced:

1. No alien enemy of the United States will be permitted to enter the grounds or buildings.

2. Only enlisted men and officers may go above the second story of Old Main, except that visitors to the tower may use the stairway marked "To the Tower." Only enlisted men and officers may enter McAllister Hall dining room. Only employees of the mess caterer may enter the mess kitchen.

3. No person who is not connected with the buildings or the War Classes will be permitted to loiter in any of the following buildings: Engineering Shops, Engineering Laboratories, Stock Pavilion.

4. Children will not be allowed to play or loiter on the grounds at any time unless attending the model school.

5. Any persons on the campus after 8:30 p. m. must keep moving. Absolute quiet must be observed on the campus and about the buildings after "Taps" (10 p. m.) except Saturday night.
