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## "DAN" BEARD TO VISIT PENN STATE

Daniel Carter Beard, better known as "Dan Beard", will speak in the Open Air Theater next Tuesday evening at seven o'clock on the subject "Scout Craft". Mr Beard is coming to State College to attend the convention of scout masters and assistant scout masters which is being held at that time.

"Dan" Beard was born in Cincinnati, Ohio, June 21, 1859. He is very well known as an artist, having studied from 1880 to 1884 at the Art Students' League in New York. He has also done illustrating for Harper's, Century, Scribner's, Life, and many books. He was the originator and instructor of the pioneer class in illustrating and teacher of animal drawing at the Woman's School of Applied Design from 1892 to 1900. This is supposed to be the first organized class in animal drawing in the world.

Mr Beard was editor of "Recreation" 1905-6. He is the creator and founder of the boy scout society, from which the English scouts and all others were modeled. He is also well known as an author, having written in addition to a number of books for boys, the following: "Moonlight and Six Feet of Romance" 1890, "Field and Forest Handy Book" 1906, "Boy Pioneers and Sons of Daniel Boone" 1909, and "Boating and Boat Building" 1912.

## SUMMER SESSION BRIEFS

About 300 teachers marched in the big military and civic parade held last Thursday, the 4th of July. Lieut. F. P. Lloyd, of the 44th Canadian Infantry, a veteran from the front spoke at the general assembly exercises last Friday morning. Among other things, Lieut. Lloyd said that it was just as necessary for the teachers to continue study as it was for the soldier to keep drilling, in order to attain the highest efficiency.

Dr. Edwin E. Sparks, president of the college delivered the commencement address to the graduating classes of various schools during the month of May and the early part of June.

Lieut. Heman, formerly basketball coach, and Lieut. Fisk, both graduates of the college, are here on a short leave of absence from Fort Arthur, Texas.

## ENROLLMENT OF TEACHERS

The enrollment of teachers at the summer session has increased to somewhat over 625. Last week it had been 558. More teachers are expected to register during the coming week.

## CLASS IN FIRST AID WORK BEING ORGANIZED

About sixty students of the summer session have enrolled in the first aid class which is being organized and will be taught under the direction of Dr. J. P. Ritzenour, the college physician. There were over one hundred in the class last year. The class will meet every Tuesday and Thursday evening; the work will be of a general nature, dealing with the cleansing, bandaging, etc., of wounds. About twenty of those enrolled intend trying for Red Cross certificates.

## PENN STATE STUDENTS TO GO TO PLATTSBURG

Penn State has been allotted thirty-eight students and eight faculty members, to be sent to a supplementary training camp at Plattsburg. The camp will open on July 18 and close on September 16, it is mainly for undergraduate students who are under the draft age.

Each one who goes will receive uniform, boarding, \$30 a month, and transportation from his home to Plattsburg and return. Following the completion of the camp, the students and faculty will return to the college and help drill the freshmen. The idea is to provide additional drill masters, as Maj. Bayless will be the only army officer at the college next fall.

Applications for admission to the camp should be sent to Dr. Sparks as soon as possible.

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## BISHOP GARLAND TO SPEAK NEXT WEDNESDAY

Another attractive feature on the summer session program will be an address next Wednesday evening in the Open Air Theater at seven o'clock by Bishop Thomas James Garland, of Philadelphia. Bishop Garland was born in Ireland on October 25, 1866. He received his education at St. Bee's College, England, and the Philadelphia Divinity School. In 1911, the degree of Doctor of Divinity was conferred upon him by the University of Pittsburgh.

Bishop Garland has been priest of churches at Pittsburgh, Johnstown, Coatsville, Loraine, Ohio, and Bristol from 1903 to 1905 he was assistant editor of the "Church Standard", he is also secretary of the Diocese of Pennsylvania, and secretary of the Third Missionary Department. He was consecrated bishop suffragan of Pennsylvania October 23, 1911.

## BOY SCOUT CAMP AT STATE COLLEGE

About one hundred and fifty boy scouts and a dozen scoutmasters and assistant scoutmasters are expected at the college the latter part of this week. They will occupy the tents on the East Campus formerly occupied by the Boys' Working Reserve, and will mess at McAllister Hall. A daily program of drill, games and instruction will be carried out. This group of boys will remain until the 17th, when another group is expected to arrive and remain until the 25th. Military drill will be given twice a day to the boys by Lieut. Charles A. Smith, Jr., Inf. R. C. who is here with the army detachment.

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
