DR. ARMSBY ABROAD ON U. S. FOOD COMMISSION

Dr. H. P. Armsby, head of the Institute of Animal Nutrition, has been in Europe, where he has been serving as one of four United States delegates on the Inter-Allied Commission for studying food nutrition.
