Former "Collegian" Man Dies In France

News has been received here that Captain Frederick C. Doss, of the class of 1914, died in France of pneumonia December 17, 1918. He was Colonel of the 10th Cavalry in his senior year, represented the college as an intercollegiate debater in 1911, was a musician of rare promise—his playing of the violin is remembered by all who ever heard him—was prominent in dramatic circles, was on the Collegian board during most of his course, was a member of several honor societies of the college, and of the Beta Theta Pi fraternity. He was graduated with honors in the course of agricultural chemistry. During the year following his graduation Captain Doss served as a chemist in the Institute of Animal Nutrition at the college, leaving it to accept a position in the Agricultural Service Bureau of the American Agricultural Chemical Company of Boston. Rejoining early that America must in evitably be drawn sooner or later into the great war in Europe, in 1916 he enlisted in the United States regular army and was stationed successively at Fort Leavenworth, Kansas, on the Mexican frontier, at Gettysburg, and at Charlotte, North Carolina, from which last point he was transferred in April, 1918, with the 6th Infantry to France. He had already won a captain's commission and went overseas as a member of the headquarters troop. He was severely wounded in July and incapacitated for two months. Rejoining his regiment in September, he was in all the battles of the Saint Mihiel salient and the Argonne forest up to the time of the armistice. From one of the Argonne forest drives he returned the only surviving officer of his regiment.

College Customs Now In Vogue

Another evidence that peace has been declared is the fact that college customs are now being enforced and no longer may the "green ones" wander nonchalantly across the grass nor the sophomores be seen with their coats off. The Student Tribunal has been elected and is ready for business and it will probably have a chance within a very short time to give material evidence of its existence.

The customs as are now being enforced are materially the same as were in vogue before the S. A. T. C. was established. A complete list can be found in any Freshman bible and the first year men are advised to become familiar with all of them. With many of the Freshmen wearing the uniforms issued them by the Government, a problem is presented whereby they may be distinguished from Sophomores and upper classmen. A plan whereby all Freshmen will be required to wear green hat cords when in the uniform is now being considered by the Student Council and if passed will have the enthusiastic backing of the Military Department. This will give some means of identification which will be evident at all times. The customs as are given in the Freshmen bible have been handed down for years and are not a sign of "rough stuff" as many of the Freshmen would believe, but have been established for the welfare of the college and the students and that end can be obtained only when all members of the student body observe them.
