

Soccer Team Is Defeated By Penn

The Penn State soccer team lost its first game of the spring season to Penn on Haverford Field on Saturday, April nineteenth. The game was filled with thrills and although Penn State played a fine game they were compelled to bow before superior playing and lost 5-0. The score does not do the Blue and White justice because it was often but was unable to put it over the line. From the beginning Penn looked like the winner, although several times the varsity made excellent spurts which made its opponents work hard to ward off the attacks. The Penn men started the game with a rush but it was not until the middle of the first half, after the ball had been advanced the entire length of the field, that they were able to score. The second goal came near the end of the period on a long shot. In the second half Penn State was more aggressive and held the ball the majority of the time. Penn scored its third goal by means of a foul but another spurt put the ball in the Blue and White's possession for the remainder of the game with the exception of two long shots which the Penn players were able to make count. Changes Are Made In New Catalogue

The general catalogue for the 1918-1919 college year has been completed and Registrar Espenshade announces the following important changes from last year's issue. The course in Agricultural Education, listed under the curriculum for the School of Agriculture, has been changed to a considerable degree. In last year's catalogue it was announced that the first two years in this course would be the same as in any of the courses in this school. This, however, is not the case as regards the new catalogue, modern languages being dropped from the course and several changes being made by changing the Sophomore and Freshman year subjects. The course has been made more suitable for the preparation of teachers for secondary schools than it has been heretofore. The course in Electrochemical Engineering has also been changed considerably, due to the great demand during the past year for men thoroughly trained in electrical and chemical subjects. The Freshman year remains the same as it was but the three other years have been changed by addition of more subjects pertaining to chemistry and electricity in their combined applications. The course in Biology, with entomology option, has given rise to a new course, that in Entomology, which is offered by the school of Natural Science. This course is intended to give a broad education in insect morphology, with subjects in economic, medical and advanced economic entomology and allied with these are subjects in zoology, biology, physiology and embryology. Plant pathology, crop and tree diseases are all emphasized in this new course. A new course has been added in the Department of Home Economics, a course in Vocational Home Training. This has been planned especially to meet the needs of women desiring to teach in the Vocational Home Economics schools of the state. The teacher in these must be one who has had a broad and comprehensive training, with the ability to teach secondary school pupils the split of home making in its broadest sense. It is her duty to teach these pupils the physical, mental, moral, spiritual, social, aesthetic and economic phases of modern homemaking and to teach them how to intelligently plan and provide for their homes.

Catholic University Defeated. In the second game of the trip, however, on Saturday, April nineteenth, there was a different story to tell. Catholic University was the opponent, but the varsity came out on top 9 to 7. Both teams put up a good brand of baseball, but the Penn State nine, by a split in the closing innings of the game, was able to nose out its opponents. Krung pitched excellently for the Blue and White, retiring eight of the enemy batters on strikes. Traubner and Craig were the heaviest scorers, each bringing in two runs, the latter also having one hit to his credit.

The team, as a whole, showed great improvement over its playing of the previous day. Catholic University led at the end of the fifth inning, but by scoring one run in the sixth, two in the seventh, and four in the eighth, Penn State secured the lead and was never headed. In fact, the Catholic pitcher, gave thirteen bases on hits. Third Defeat at W. and L. The third defeat of the Penn State nine came at Washington, Virginia, on Tuesday, April twentieth, when Washington and Lee triumphed, four to nothing. This game was in the form of a pitchers' duel between Gramley of Penn State, and Graham of W. and L. As far as twirling went, neither seemed to have any great advantage, the former striking out five and giving four bases on balls, while the latter retired nine and batted three passes. However, the southern twirler received the better support, both in the field and at the bat. The Penn State team made five errors and secured but three hits, while the Virginians made six safe blows and committed three errors.
