of the camp is to make the boy mentally fit, mechanically skillful and physically developed for a season's work on a farm.

This year's camp will be conducted virtually along the same lines as that of last season. Three hundred boys will be accommodated at one time and will be kept busy learning the farming operations. The entire equipment of the School of Agriculture will be placed at the disposal of the instructors giving the work.

**Practical Work**

The boys will learn to milk the cows of the college herd, and will learn to harness and to drive the college teams. All the instruction will be made as practical as possible and consequently there will be no class room work. Such problems as care of cows and cow barns, milking of feeds, feeding, milking and weighing milk, cooling and separating milk, making butter, handling of horses in barns and in general all farm work will be taken up.

Each day will be divided into two periods and this allows for different kinds of work combinations to be made. The boys will be divided into units and at all times they will be in charge of one of the men chosen as a leader.

The campers will be quartered in tents arranged in a military camp and in this way it will afford the physical benefits of outdoor living and regular hours of eating and sleeping.

The weather on Saturday was a little more fitted for track events but at the best was far too cold for good work. The Blue and White team managed to capture second place in the Class B relay championship, with Syracuse first, and Holy Cross third. The entries in this event were Boston, Holy Cross, Syracuse, Penn State, Columbia and Washburn. Pitt had entered a team but withdrew in order to compete in the all college championship relay medley.

Taylor finished the first quarter of the race with a big lead for the Blue and White and was able to pass this on to Parent. Parent was able to hold this for the first 300 yards but slowed up in the last 140 yards and Conlin, the Syracuse man, was able to pass him at this point. General Peabody's young son, who also was in the party on the "Leviathan." As a result, Sergeant Brown was detailed here in place of Sergeant Wolz.
