I. N. A. CONFERENCE
HELD AT EASTON

being Dr. Albert H. Heckle, dean of Lafayette College; Dr. H. B. Rossard, head of the Department of Political Science and Economics at Lafayette; Mr. Baldwin, representing the War Risk Insurance Bureau at Washington, D. C., and Dr. D. Thomas Curtin, known internationally as the "man who dragged the truth out of Germany."

Dr. Heckle stated that college atmosphere was better because of the college newspapers, which should contain history, and should mould and shape student opinion. He welcomed the I. N. A. to Lafayette College, and extended the freedom of the campus. Dr. Rossard spoke of the relation between college men and journalists, saying that each to be successful had to observe the qualities of exactness, promptness, and the sense of importance of one's self. Mr. Baldwin gave a general discussion of the workings of War Risk Insurance and pledged himself to cooperate with the Association in every manner possible.

The main address of the conference was given by Dr. Curtin, who after serving in Germany for many months as a correspondent to the American Press, left shortly before the declaration of war by the United States, and went to London. Here he made known through the Lord Northcliffe newspapers much of the news which had been censored by the German officials in Germany. Dr. Curtin's talk dealt with the idea that newspapers simply cannot be separated from public life and he quoted many specific examples where the newspaper had been instrumental in shaping international policies in the European war, and in a number of cases had determined the plan of military campaigns in the field. Dr. Curtin is an exceedingly forceful speaker, and with the material he had to present, delivered one of the most interesting, attractive and stirring addresses which has ever been given in the field of collegiate journalism.
