Playing hard, clean football, Penn State's gridiron warriors ran rough-shod over the weak Ursinus eleven on New Beaver Field last Saturday afternoon, and when the dust of conflict had cleared away the visitors were found flattened under a 48-7 score.

As in the Dartmouth game of the week before, "Charlie" Way again pulled off the stellar event of the afternoon by running through the entire Ursinus team for a touchdown on the opening kick-off.

During the first period Captain Higgins and his men rolled up a total of 13 points, the first of these resulting from Way's spectacular touchdown and the remainder from a touchdown by Hess and a goal by Cabbage.

With the opening of the second half the first team was again given an opportunity to try its driving power on the Ursinus aggregation but this time the visitor's defense stiffened perceptibly and State's warriors were held scoreless throughout the period.

Ursinus Scores on Fumble. The only Ursinus score of the day came in the last few minutes of play, after the third team had been sent in to replace the second.
