TALENTED PREACHER FOR BACCALAUREATE SERMON

The baccalaureate sermon will be delivered on Sunday morning at ten-thirty. Seniors will meet in front of the Library at ten-fifteen and proceed to the Auditorium in a body, caps and gowns being worn. The sermon will be preached by Dr. Charles Jefferson, pastor of the Broadway Tabernacle, New York City.

Dr. Jefferson is a graduate of Ohio Wesleyan University and has received degrees from University of Boston, Union College and Yale. He has been at his pastorate which is the oldest Congregational church in Greater New York, for twenty-two years. He was elected a member of the Yale Foundation, being the first clergyman outside the state of Connecticut on whom this honor was bestowed since its foundation two hundred years ago. In addition to his work as clergyman and pastor he has done considerable writing and is the author of some twelve books on various subjects. The subjects on which he has written include religion, theology, sociology and several on the causes and outcome of the Great War.

METHODIST CHURCH TENDERS SCHOLARSHIPS

The Methodist Episcopal Church War Emergency Committee will assign scholarships to needy students in The Pennsylvania State College, next year as follows:
 To any student who was discharged

from the army or navy since April 1920 \$250.
 To any student having been gulated and not now receiving military pay, \$150.
 To any student now receiving military pay, \$50.

To deserving students now on the scholarship list the same sum as they received the present year.
 The sums mentioned above are maximum. Specific information must be sent to headquarters concerning the purpose for which the scholarship money was expended.
