NEWS NOTES FROM THE DEPARTMENT OF MUSIC

Miss Mary Shaw of Haverhill, Mass., secretary of the eastern music supervisors conference, has been added to the department this summer and is in charge of the music in the demonstration school.

The Summer Session chorus is making progress on "Hannah's Wedding Feast", by Coleridge Taylor, and will present it in the Open Air Theatre before the end of the session.

Rural music is being given a prominent place in the various courses offered by the department this summer. In this connection, Miss Brownell, representing the Victor Talking Machine Company will come here next Tuesday to give a course in rural grade and high school music. The course will be open to all students and will meet on Tuesday at 3 30 in the Auditorium. The remaining meetings will be by appointment.

Miss Laura B. Staley, who is assisting Dean C C Robinson with most of the chorus work of the session, is president of the music section of the State Educational Association, and she is helping to arrange a program of rural music for the conference on December 28 and 29 during the regular session of the State Educational Association at Harrisburg. All rural teachers are urged to attend the state meeting.

The National Federated Music Clubs and the Pennsylvania State Federated Music Clubs, through the Matinee Music Club of Philadelphia, are cooperating with Paul Beck, state supervisor of music, and Mr Lee Driver, director of rural schools, to bring better music to the rural schools. The plan is to have each club in the state act as a sponsor for one rural school, and to provide a Victrola and records for that school, in addition to musical entertainments. In order to bring the best music to rural communities, rural schools desiring musical talent for a program will be able to secure it free of cost by writing to the Matinee Music Club of Philadelphia.

The singing at the morning assemblies and at the campus singing on Wednesday nights has been better than ever this year. All are urged to come out.
