

NOTED MEN SCHEDULED TO SPEAK IN CHAPEL

Prominent College Presidents, Ministers, Lawyers, Writers and Editors on List.

The College Presidents, twelve ministers including two bishops, a lawyer, writers and former editors all appear on the list of speakers for the Sunday chapel services during the first semester. On a tentative list of the College Preachers from the President's Office a few vacancies and changes are still to be made. However, a full list of the names and type of speakers for the first part of the year can be obtained by planning over the calendar. Among the speakers are found many well known and popular men who will have some message to bring to the students of Penn State from their own experiences while in college and also in later life. Every speaker has been selected for some particular merit and no student can afford to miss any of the talks.

Doctor Samuel C. Black, President of Washington and Jefferson College appears on the list. Another school president on the schedule is Reverend Clarence A. Harbort, of the Rochester Theological Seminary. Another interesting and popular lecturer is Rev. C. M. Sheldon of Topeka, Kansas. Doctor Sheldon has been invited to give a lecture on the life of Christ and has written many books as well as having been editor of a church paper. Rev. Owen R. Loveloy, another speaker, is General Secretary of the National Child Labor Commission in the interest of Child Labor Reform. Bishop Edw. T. Thibot of South Bethlehem Pa., was formerly headmaster of Saint James' Military Academy. He has written various magazine articles in his career. Many other preachers of local fame have also been listed. In addition to college presidents and clergymen, a prominent lawyer has been asked to speak here. He is Franklin E. Edmonds, Esq., a well known member of the bar at Philadelphia, and formerly a professor of political science at Swarthmore. Mr. Edmonds was also an editor and has written many articles.

(Continued from first page) went back in the second half and broke up many of the Gettysburg plays. Captain Hess played a good steady game at guard, and he should be able to hold his own against Dartmouth. In the fourth quarter, Charlie Way and Haines were the leading lights. The former was handclapped by the latter after a footing but managed to get away for runs of 15 and 20 yards. Haines merely failed to gain when given the ball and he made several beautiful runs. Under instructions from Haddock, Snell saved himself as much as possible because of his recent injury, but he never failed to make the necessary distance when given the ball. Williams played his usual good game and should steadily improve as the season grows older. State scored its first touchdown right at the start of the second quarter, after it had practically been played to a standstill during the first period. Tiding the ball on the Gettysburg 31 yard line, line plunges by Haines, Williams and Snell carried it to the 20 yard line. Way and Snell made seven yards between them, and then Charlie broke through to the eight yard line. On the next play, Haines went through tackle for a touchdown, and Schuster missed the goal. The final score came in the fourth quarter. Starting on her own in third line, Penn State carried the ball right down the field, with Way, Haines, and Snell alternating in carrying the pigskin. Hinkle finally pushed it to the two yard line and Snell plunged over for the score. Rauch kicked the

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bill squarely between the uplights for the additional point.

As an indication of what may be expected against Dartmouth on Saturday, the Gettysburg game can hardly be considered. The shifted lineup and the fact that the Blue and White used a limited attack prevented anyone from getting an accurate line on the strategy of the varsity that will tackle the 116 Green team. Unquestionably, the past week must witness a decided improvement in team-play if Penn State is to have a chance against Dartmouth, but a week of hard practice will remedy many of the faults brought out in the Gettysburg game. The split of the squad is one of determination, with a little desperation thrown in, for the players realize that they are going to meet a vicious team. The backing and moral support of the students and alumni will play a prominent part in the game, and when a team has such support and goes into a game with the determination not to be beaten, they are doubly hard to defeat. Coach Haddock is working hard this week to get in shape and he has the confidence of both students and players.
