DARTMOUTH GAME WILL BE GREATEST IN EAST

showed exceptional headwork in this position. Although not as consistent a ground runner as Grundman he nevertheless is a great field general and makes up for his running by this quality. Jordan, playing at fullback and a runner for himself last year by his consistent line play. He is one of the mainstays of the team in the offensive. Holbrook is a defensive man although he may be counted upon to do his share of the work in the way of line play. Although Coach Speas has had some trouble with his wing positions he nevertheless seems to have a formidable pair in the form of Worth and Postel. The latter has been shifted from the backfield while the former was selected as the best of the nine who were trying out for the position. Sonnenberg and Neidinger line up in the tackle position while Crisp and Moore will play at guard. Crisp was out of the game for a short time with a bad shoulder but he has fully recovered and is better than ever. Cunningham at center is one of the mainstays of the line. In fact, as a defensive player it is hard to find his equal. The line averages but 180 pounds but is very fast while the backfield is a combination of speed and weight. In all the team presents a very formidable appearance. This is probably the most important game on the Green schedule and the student body are looking upon it as the deciding game of the year. The team stayed at the Spruce Creek Country Club last night and will motor to the game.

Blue and White Ready
The Penn State eleven has put in a busy week making the final preparations for this contest. The first two games have Coach Egelek opportunity for seeing what his men were capable of doing under fire and the consequent workouts have bettered their

work along various lines. The Blue and White men realize the potency of this contest and have been working hard to prepare themselves for it. They have been heart and soul in their work and whatever the outcome of the game this Saturday, they will never be any doubt as to whether the men played the best football "better than your best" will be a major portion of their work in this game. They have set themselves to the task and will produce every effort to add to the glory of Penn State.

During the week the men have been given all types of workouts. Straight football has been used consistently, but several new plays have also been worked out. The Blue and White line-up this week will be with out the services of Ray Baei, who was injured over a week ago, and Dick Rauch, who was removed earlier in the week. The Blue and White team will be several pounds lighter than the Big Green stone wall, but spirit and fighting force is expected to make up for that deficiency. The Dartmouth line is much more experienced than the Penn State line and a great battle will be fought out between these opposing forces. Every Penn State man is in back of that line and if moral support has as great an effect as it is supposed to have, then the line will hold. The work of the backfields has been improving steadily, but the lack of sufficient interference is felt.

During the week Killinger was shifted to quarter in place of Williams who has not been well for some time and the play of the former has been a favorable part of the week's work. Snell is at his old position at full, and is expected to bear a great portion of the work of beating down the opponent's line. At the back are "Charlie" Way and "Hinkle" Haines, both of whom have been doing fine work all week. Way was one of the men on the Blue and White eleven who was so greatly feared by the Dartmouth team and his work this Saturday will be watched greatly by the Hanoverites. In view of this fact, "Charlie" may not be able to make many spec-

ular runs against them, but his work will be a great feature of the Blue and White offense and it would not be surprising if he were to uncock one of those beautiful, dodging, squirming runs of his over the Green goal line. Haines has also been doing work of the same type as Way. "Hinkle" is a wonder at dodging and his runs through the tackles mean many a yard gained for the Blue and White. Brown and McCollum continue at the wing positions. Brown has been playing up old-time form and his tackling is becoming a potent factor in the team's defensive play. McCollum has improved and has been getting down the field under punts and on forward passes with a speed and accuracy that makes him a desirable man for the end position. At center is "Deutscher" Bentz. His work this season has been of such a character that in spite of the short time he has been out for football this fall, he is the man for the center post. His passing, while not up to form in the last game, has been greatly improved and will be steady and accurate. On other side of him will be found Captain Harold Hess and "Red" Griffiths. Hess has been doing fine work on the line and bids fair to make as great a name for himself as he did in the backfield. His punting has bettered itself and the Blue and White captain may be expected to put up a great duel with Dartmouth's star kicker. "Red" was substituted for Rauch early in the week and has worked hard to be worthy of the post, and his play tomorrow will be indicative of what he will do for Penn State. At the tackles are Beck and Schuster. Both of them are mainstays on the defense and when the Blue and White takes the ball, holes will be opened on the line where these men play. Beck is an ideal lineman, as great as he was in the backfield and his fight and spirit are factors in keeping up the morale of the men who play alongside him as well as the whole team. Schuster is playing his first year on the varsity and bids fair to become a permanent lineman under the Blue and White.

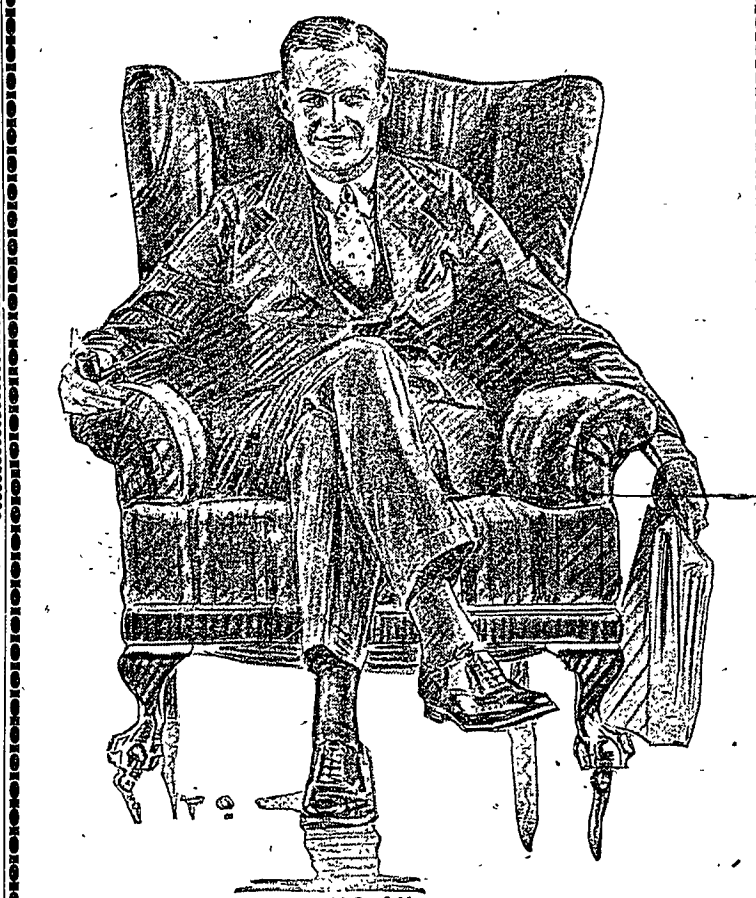
