PERSONNEL OF VARSITY QUARTET IS SELECTED

After almost a month of competition four men have been selected to make up the personnel of the Varsity quartet which will go on a concert tour in December to the Panama Canal Zone under the auspices of the United States Government. An accompanist, a reader and the director of the organization, Dean C. Robinson, will accompany the Blue and White singers on the trip, which is for the purpose of providing entertainment for the employees of the government who are located in the isthmus.

The personnel of the organization which was selected Wednesday, is as follows: first tenor, A. R. Kennard '21, second tenor, H. H. Tolston '24, baritone, E. W. Knapp '21, second bass, A. W. Stoelzing '22, H. Fishburn '22 will act as accompanist and Miss Ruth Jackson of the Department of English will in all probability go along with the party as reader.

Itinerary of the Tour.

Before leaving here for New York on December eighth, the Varsity Quartet will give a concert in the Auditorium on the night preceding their departure. The same program that is to be rendered on the tour will be given at this time. Admission to the affair will be placed at a very low price, and the proceeds from the affair will be used to help defray the railroad expenses to New York, where the party will sail for the Canal Zone on December ninth. After a ten voyage of a week's duration the Penn State entertainers will arrive at their destination and will at once begin to give concerts at the various club houses maintained there by the government. The return home will be made during the latter part of December and will include only one stop-over, this being for the purpose of giving a concert at either the Brooklyn Y. M. C. A. or at one of the "Y" branches which are located in New York City. It is expected that the party will arrive back in State College about the time that college resumes work after the Christmas vacation.

Novel Program Planned

The same type of unique program that has always featured this organization is being arranged for the tour and consequently for the concert, which they will render before their departure. A banjo-mandolin quintet has been formed and will take in the members of the quartet and the accompanist. E. W. Knapp is also being groomed by Director Robinson in some of his characteristic humor and along this line will be added by A. W. Stoelzing. A joint number of these two members of the quartet is at the present time being planned and should be a big factor in making the program diversified. Miss Jackson also promises to come in for her share of the honors, especially in the number in which she will be aided by the songsters.

While the repertoire has not been definitely decided upon, various Penn State songs such as "Fetters," "Blue and White" and the "Alma Mater" will be used as the closing numbers in every concert. Regular rehearsals on the songs that will make up the program are being held every other day in the Auditorium.

Penn Game Dance Being Arranged

At the meeting of the Philadelphia alumni on September thirtieth, officers for the ensuing year were elected and plans made for the Smoker and Dance to be held in connection with the Penn State-Penn game. The smoker will be held in the Clover Room of the Bellevue-Stratford Hotel, Philadelphia, on the eve of the contest, October twentieth. It is planned to have several informal talks and a general social time on the gruler of the got-together held every year at the time of the Pitt game in Pittsburgh. The Varsity Quartette may also sing at the affair.

The Dance will take place October 20th and will be held in the Ball Room of the Bellevue-Stratford Hotel. Last year it was held in the Rose Room and the affair was so successful that it has seemed best to use the larger ball room this season. The tickets are now on sale and may be obtained from the officers of the local Philadelphia County Club or from J. J. McGarrigle, the newly elected secretary of the Philadelphia Alumni Widener Building, Philadelphia, care of the Midvale Steel Company.

The officers that were chosen to guide the affairs of the Philadelphia Alumni for the ensuing year are as follows: President, G. M. Downing '23, First Vice-President, G. D. Hesselbacher '16, Secretary-Treasurer, J. J. McGarrigle '14.

The Penn State-Penn game is likely to be a bigger affair this year than ever before. An unusually large number of reservations have been asked for by the alumni and the student delegation will be in proportion. So far the Athletic Association has received applications for over fifteen hundred tickets from the alumni alone. The student sale of tickets will be held shortly.

of St. James' Church and of St. James' Military Academy in Macon, Missouri from 1873 to 1887. On the twenty-seventh of May, 1887, Reverend Talbot was consecrated Missionary Bishop of Wyoming and Idaho. He occupied this office in the far western district of his church for eleven years and was then transferred to the diocese of Bethlehem where he has been located ever since.

During these years Bishop Talbot has gained wide renown in the literary world for he has been the author of many widely known articles of recognized literary value. Some of those that have attracted natural attention are "My People of the Plains," "A Bishop Among His Flock," "Tim—An Autobiography of a Dog," "A Bishop's Message," and numerous sermons, pamphlets, and magazine articles.

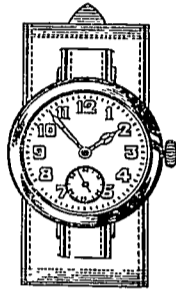
It was announced at the smoker that a dance had been arranged for the eleventh of December and that it would be held in the Phi Delta Theta fraternity house.
