### News From Other Colleges

**PENNSYLVANIA**—A fencing rally was held last week in the gymnasium at which exhibition bouts were given by two graduates who were members of the Olympic fencing team. An exceptionally large number of candidates turned out so that the prospects for the coming season are exceedingly bright.

**GETTYSBURG**—It was decided at the fourth semi-annual convention of the Intercollegiate Newspaper Association, recently held at Penn State, to hold the next session at Gettysburg during the coming spring.

**SWARTHMORE**—Senator Harding defeated Governor Cox by almost a three to one majority in a straw ballot recently conducted by the Swarthmore undergraduates.

**UNIVERSITY**—The most elaborate celebration in the history of the college occurred last week when appropriate exercises celebrating the fiftieth anniversary of this institution were held. Many noted men and women of the state attended and took an active part in the ceremonies.

**TRINITY**—The open field running of Boynton, Williams' All-American candidate, was the outstanding feature of the game which Trinity lost to Williams by the one-sided score of 80 to 0. The Purple's captain personally accounted for six of the nine touchdowns and also hurled two forward passes that resulted in scores.

**CARNEGIE TECH**—Col. W. D. Scott, who for three years was connected with the Division of Applied Psychology at this institution, was recently appointed president of Northwestern University. In 1919 Colonel Scott was awarded the Distinguished Service Medal "for especially meritorious and conspicuous service in originating, organizing, and putting into operation the system of classification of enlisted men in the United States Army."

**OHIO WESLEYAN**—Immense preparations are being made for Homecoming Day when it is expected that the largest alumni reunion in the annals of the institution will take place. A large parade will occur in addition to a football game in the afternoon.

**CORNELL**—The Varsity cross country team completely outclassed the Harvard hurriers over the six-mile Harvard course and defeated them by

the score of 112 to 28. Cornell men captured the first eleven places, while McDermott, the winner, broke the record for the course by forty seconds.

**TOLEDO**—The student body after a heated discussion decided to drop football for the present season because of the disastrous results attained thru the playing of games with larger institutions. This decision was reached after the student council and football team had expressed their wish that all games be cancelled.

#### FIRST NOVEMBER WEEK NOTED FOR BIG CONTESTS

The first week in November has always proved to be one of the most interesting weeks of the year for Penn State since it has always brought forth important football games. It was five years ago that the big Blue and White team lost to the Harvard eleven by the score of 13 to 0 in a heart breaking contest featured by long runs, savage playing, and severe penalties. The offensive of the Nittany Lion was always dangerous and its varied attack bewildered its rivals, and although the Nittany men completely outplayed their opponents, they were forced to bow in defeat because of costly fumbles and penalties. The remarkable playing of Berryman and Higgins for State were the outstanding features of the game.

Ten years ago the Penn State representatives for the first time in four years, on home grounds were pitted to a standstill by a college team, namely Villanova. Eleven times State brought the ball within her opponent's ten yard line and yet could not push the pliskin for a touchdown when Villanova lacked a strong offense and only threatened to score once. It was the most unusual football game ever staged on Beaver Field.
