MANY VICTORIES RECORDED IN BASKETBALL HISTORY

The beginning of January has seen many important games for the Blue and White basketball team. Six years ago, January 9, 1915, a remarkably fast basketball game resulted in a 33 to 31 victory for the Blue and White quintet over the Harrisburg Collegians.

Three years ago Penn State's basketball team won a decisive victory over Lehigh, the final score being 44 to 29. The game was interesting throughout although the Blue and White was never in danger of losing its lead. The game was exceedingly clean and while a number of fouls were called on each team they were all for technicalities and not because of personal roughness.

Syracuse invaded State with an excellent record of victories at home and abroad having played in the neighborhood of forty games with but few defeats on record.
