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NEW AG CHEM HEAD HAS HAD WIDE EXPERIENCE

Professor R. A. Dutcher, of the University of Minnesota has been appointed Professor of Chemical Agriculture at Penn State, to fill the position left open by the resignation of Dr. C. W. Stoddart which takes effect July 1.

Professor Dutcher has had much experience in this work and should prove a valuable asset to the Agricultural Department. He secured his B. S. degree from South Dakota State College in 1907 and his M. S. from the same institution in 1910. In 1912 he received his M. A. from the University of Missouri, and since that time he has completed all the residence work for his doctorate at the University of Minnesota. Professor Dutcher served as an instructor in Chemistry at South Dakota State College from 1907 to 1910, at the University of Missouri from 1910 to 1912, and at the University of Illinois from 1912 to 1913. He also served as Assistant Professor of Agricultural Chemistry at the Ohio Agricultural College from 1913 to 1919 and at the University of Minnesota from 1917 to 1918. During the war he served as a Captain in the Sanitary Corps of the U. S. Army, and his attention to matters relating to nutrition. Since he was discharged from the army, he has been associate professor and head of the Section of Animal Nutrition at the University of Minnesota. He is a member of many honorary scientific societies and also the author of numerous bulletins and papers.
