

PENN STATE TRACK MEN EASILY DEFEAT COLGATE

(Continued from first page) McMahon finished in the order named in putting the shot, Beck winning with a throw of 37 feet 1 inch. The other three men to roll up nine points for the Blue and White were Taylor, Demming and Newcomer. Captain Demming led the race until the half way point was reached. At that time Taylor began to show a little more speed and he and Demming ran neck and neck until within a few feet of the tape, Taylor winning by a few inches, the time being 50 3-5 seconds. By winning these two events the Penn State runners advanced their score eighteen points, making the score at this time 35 to 10.

The pole vault by clearing the bar at 11 feet 6 inches, and Parent won the high jump with a spring of 5 feet 5 1-4 inches.

Romig Breaks Record

The most spectacular race of the afternoon was the two mile race in which "Hondy" Romig lowered the college record by 12 1-5 seconds. This record was formerly held by R. D. Watts '12 whose time was 9 minutes 41 1-5 seconds. Romig finished the race in 9 minutes 29 seconds flat. At the very start of the race he set a fast pace which he maintained throughout. After the first lap he began to forge ahead considerably with Cooper following in second place, Snyder in third and H. W. Callahan of Colgate in fourth place. During the second lap Callahan steadied himself and began to pick up speed, passing Snyder and in the next lap passing Cooper. Romig, however, was still running at the swift pace that he set when the race started and when the first mile was run he led Callahan by at least fifty yards. In the next four laps Romig increased his lead to at least 250 yards coming within seven seconds of equalling the intercollegiate record and at the same time lowering the Penn State record.

Clearfield High Wins Relay

Bellefonte Academy hit the half century mark in points in the interscholastic Track and Field meet which was held on New Beaver Field last Saturday, and consequently won the interscholastic Track Championship of the state. The fight for second place in the meet was more exciting than the fight for first place for Bellefonte Academy had no rivals who at any time dangerously threatened her score, while on the other hand, the winner of second place was undecided until the end of the last race when Harrisburg Technical High School's score was found to total up to 28 1-2 points, with Johnstown High coming in third with 25 points. Bellefonte Academy had a monopoly on the field events and it was due to her victory in this part of the program that she won the meet, for she did not place in a single track event.

The one mile relay race and the two mile run were the most interesting events on the interscholastic schedule. Clearfield High won the relay, Johnstown came in second and Williamsport came in third. In the two mile race, Vincent of Johnstown, nosed out Shue, of Harrisburg Tech. in a very exciting race.

This year the number of lads who participated in the events was greater than at any previous time. Over two hundred and twenty men from the various high and preparatory schools throughout the state were on hand to compete in the games. The standing of the schools was as follows:

New York University Falls

On the following day, the Blue and White batsmen traveled to New York City and, in another very close game, defeated New York University by 4 to 3, a timely hit by Koehler bringing in Rintz in the eighth inning with the winning tally. Penn State drew the first blood in the second frame by scoring two runs after Rintz had drawn a walk and Korb had doubled. Koehler had singled previously but was caught between second and third. Brumbaugh drove in Korb. In the next inning, the Nittany men annexed their third run by means of two safe wallops. Mearkle scoring, while the New York players went scoreless for four frames. At the opening of their half of the fifth, they got busy, connected with two of Hunter's offerings for singles and won two bases on balls a pair of runs going across the plate before they could be effectually stopped. Miller was sent in for Hunter by Coach Bezdek in the sixth and, although the metropolis team secured another tally then, they lacked an efficient punch for the remainder of the contest and did not score again. The final and winning run for Penn State came in the eighth, with two men down. Both Ullery and Haines were thrown out and then Rintz knocked a single, scoring a minute later on a safe blow by Koeh-

ler and an error. Hunter pitched well for four innings but began to wobble slightly in the fifth and "Bez" deemed it best to use Miller for the other four frames. Hirschfeld, hurling for New York, twirled the entire game. Lightner was injured in the game with Princeton and could not appear against the city men, his place being taken by Rintz, who played a bang-up game.

Yale Trained by 9 to 3

The Nittany diamond men continued their good work on Friday, despite the fact that it was the thirteenth of the month, and upset the Yale Bulldog by a 9 to 3 count. The New Haven team was compelled to use three moundsmen because of the fierce slugging of Penn State batsmen and could not touch Thomas sufficiently after the first inning to equal the Nittany score. Chittenden, Robinson and Selleck, who pitched for Yale gave fifteen safe bingles the majority of these coming in the last frame when Penn State annexed six runs. "Bez's" tossers secured two runs in the very first inning but the Bulldog got a tally too and although it was outlaid in the next seven innings, managed to hold his own until the fatal ninth. Robinson, hurling for the New England outfit after the second inning, used a slow ball that baffled the Nittany men for several innings, but he was hammered out in the ninth and Selleck, who took his place was also hit hard. Thomas, who went the entire distance for Penn State, yielded three hits in the first inning but scathed down afterward and took things rather easy. He fanned nine men, gave the Yale batters nine safe bingles, and walked four. He also made three of the hits scored by the Nittany aggregation. Captain Hines proved to be the most consistent hitter of the Penn State nine as he knocked out three singles and a double while Ullery was the heaviest hitter of the day, putting out a two-bagger and a triple.
