

ENDOWMENT FUND WELL SUPPORTED

College Will Receive Benefit of Fifty Thousand Dollar Endowment

The class graduating this year has decided itself to an endowment fund of fifty thousand dollars. This fund will be placed in a trust which will pay the interest to the college for the benefit of the students. The college has done for it as previously announced. The fund of this size has not been definitely decided but it is sure to be something that is worth while and useful to the student body. At its first session in 1920, the members of the class will meet to see how the money will be used.

About one hundred and seventy seniors have taken out twenty year endowment policies with the college as beneficiary. These policies will be worth three hundred dollars each when the payment of them is completed, which will be in twenty years. The Blue and White Institution will not have to wait this long, however, for the endowment to materialize. According to present plans, when the class meets five years from now and decides on the form of the memorial, the money will be borrowed on the spot so that Penn State will profit at once from the gifts without waiting so long.

At one time it was proposed that the money raised should be employed to construct a swimming pool at Penn State. This plan has met with favor and may be adopted by the class, although nothing definite can be said now concerning this. The students have long felt the need of a swimming tank at State College and such an addition would be welcomed enthusiastically by them. No matter what the Senior will vote to give to the Mitty's institution, it is sure to be something by which the students will benefit.

The committee that guided and directed the campaign was instrumental in its success. Fred H. Wood, chairman, F. J. Stevenson and G. M. Spangler were the members of the committee holding the drive who spent a large amount of time and energy in striving to win the largest number of subscribers possible. R. K. Williams headed the sales committee of about forty seniors who did the work of seeing that all the members of their classes were given the opportunity to take out a policy.

UNVEILING OF WAR MEMORIAL DELAYED

New Committee Appointed by Student Council to Erect Bronze Tablet

The appointment of a new War Memorial Committee to take the place of the retiring committee marks another step of progress toward the realization of a true Penn State Memorial to show the appreciation of the college for the deeds which the Mitty's boys did toward the carrying on of the war. At the beginning of the year it was thought to be fitting that the college should recognize the sacrifice made during the two years of war by erecting a bronze tablet on some conspicuous spot on the campus. The Student Council gave the matter thorough consideration and the result of which was the appointment of two committees, one of which was to raise the finances that would be necessary in the purchase and erection of the memorial under the direction of K. R. Stark '21, and another to select the design and secure bids for the project under the chairmanship of F. G. Church '21. Both of these committees worked hard and faithfully through the year and the results of their efforts are that the memorial is almost a reality.

At the same time, several of the largest engraving companies in the country were asked to submit bids on the project and these were received near the first of April. The bids ranged from nine hundred dollars to fifteen hundred dollars depending on the amount of elaborate workmanship proposed. The committee discussed the possibility of each bid and finally came to the conclusion that the two best should only be considered, that these should not be about twelve hundred dollars, and that they should be the two that would most likely meet the approval of the student body. These bids have been selected and the committee has asked companies submitting the bids to reconsider their action and to give their final quotations. The close of the semester has interrupted the work of the committee so that the Student Council necessarily appointed another to carry on the work where interrupted. The new committee that was appointed consists of R. F. Burtis '22, R. B. Buer '22, C. V. Bell, L. V. Steiner and Professor A. L. Koehler of the Architectural Engineering Department.

Unveiling of Tablet Postponed
It was at first planned to make the unveiling of the bronze memorial one of the chief attractions on the commencement week program but the date had to be postponed because of the delay in raising the fund. The new committee has set the day for the event to be on Alumni Day of next semester when an unusually large number of alumni will return to their Alma Mater to honor their friends and classmates who left the institution in the defense of the country. Besides, the members of the faculty and student body, and a multitude of the friends of the college will be on hand to pay their homage to the dead. The tablet will be unveiled in the Auditorium and will remain there for the present time because this is the place best suited on the campus for sheltering Penn State's visible offering of honor. The tablet will remain in the Auditorium until the proposed Memorial Hall shall be erected at which time it will be taken to its new position.

Change in Appearance

The committee wishes to announce to the student body that the original conception of the memorial will be altered somewhat to add to the dignity and appearance of the tablet. Instead of being twice as long as it is, the committee thinks that a con-
