

**RECORD ATTENDANCE AT SUMMER SESSION**

**Over 1900 Take Courses, Making Greatest Number Ever to Attend Popular Session**

All previous records for attendance at the annual Summer Session were broken this last summer with a total enrollment of one thousand nine hundred and five.

Of this number 1374 were women students and 531 were men. College students, regularly enrolled in the four year courses, were more numerous than ever at the Summer Session, with a total of 178, while one hundred Rehabs also attended.

In the summer of 1920, the total enrollment at the session was 1340. The registration this summer showed an increase of over five hundred and fifty students, an increase of over forty per cent. Ever since the war the teachers' session has been increasing by great bounds and it is expected that in a number of years that the enrollment will even exceed that of the regular four year courses.

Dr. Smith came to Penn State in 1911 after completing his work for his Doctor's Degree at the University of Munich, Germany. In 1914 he first came into contact with the Summer Session when he was Acting Director in place of Dean Weber, who was on leave of absence. In 1915 he was made Director and has held that position ever since.

During Dr. Smith's Directorship, the Summer Session has greatly increased in popularity and it has been largely through his efforts that this growth was made. When he took charge the

enrollment was 540 and every year the registration has grown, until now its importance is almost equal to that of the Winter Session.

Dr. Knauss has gone to the Florida State College for Women where he is

to become Professor of History. At Penn State he was Associate Professor of History in addition to being Assistant Director of the Summer Session.

Dr. Knauss came to Penn State in

1913, three years after his graduation from Lohigh University. With the exception of the two years from 1916 to 1918 spent in taking his degree of

Doctor of Philosophy at Cornell, he

has been at State College. While at Penn State, Dr. Knauss has specialized in European History and had practically charge of that branch of the History Department.
