Reservation of Seats and Exchange of Tickets for Course Strips Commences Thursday

The popularity of the Combined Music and Entertainment Course for the season of 1921-1922 is assured by the number of advance tickets already sold in the campus now being conducted.

Of the one thousand season tickets now on sale R. Klause '21 who is in charge of the sales, reports that over three hundred have already been disposed of.

Two new plans in the selling of season tickets have been inaugurated this year. Student salesmen are receiving a liberal commission for each ticket sold instead of the older method employed last year of rewarding sales by offering season tickets.
