PRACTICAL RELIGION IS FIRST, SAYS DR. POTTER

Chapel Speaker Brings Out The Possibilities of Practicing The Golden Rule

Using that part of the scriptures taken from the first letter from Paul to the Corinthians, which says "Godliness is profitable unto all things," Dr. Rockwell H. Potter of Hartford, Connecticut, gave a plea for old fashioned type of God-trusting religion. In his sermon he pointed out the benefits derived from leading such a life and also the common wrong opinion of the results of it.

To go to church, or to say prayers is not necessary to lead a Godly life. It is the fear of God, justice to men, loving mercy, walking humbly before God, and loving thy neighbors as thyself that is necessary for a man to live a Godly life. Some people have a wrong impression that it is impossible to do successful business while thinking of justice and loving mercy. They think that is impossible to make a reputation while walking humbly before God. That to make friends they must follow the crowd and they think the righteous man will be lonely. But these are all wrong, no dividends will ever be paid from such investments as these. Godliness is the only investment that pays dividends in the life to come.

It is the same way in securing a reputation, not one that is merely a blaze and noise but one that is swift and true and grows out of a character. Living straight, being kind, walking humbly before God and loving thy neighbor may not get your picture in the feature sections of the Sunday papers but it will build you up a reputation that will last all your life. Reputations secured in other manners will not.

Rand, director of evangelical work in Russia, and Alton A. Clark, of the American Board are among those listed on the program.

A meeting of all interested will be held Wednesday evening in room 100 Hunt Building, when Dr. F. L. Pattee will address the group.
