EXTENSION COURSE FOR TEACHERS VERY POPULAR

The Extension Course in Teaching for Teachers, which is being conducted under the direction of the Extension Department of the College, has shown a marked success for the short time in which it has been offered. The course was established last September and in the first semester of its existence the enrollment is almost equal to the largest annual enrollment of any institution ever conducting extension courses. Classes are being conducted in Downsville, Turtletown, Oskida, Altoona, Bellefonte, and Oil City with many more communities under consideration. In the Pittsburgh district alone, the extension courses of the first semester enrolled about 1200 while in the other districts the percentage of enrollment is almost equal to this excellent record. All of the courses carry college credit, and apply on the requirements of the new state certificate for teachers. Many of the registrants who are now pursuing the courses have expressed their intentions of continuing their studies in the Summer Session for Teachers at Penn State next summer.
