SCHOLARSHIP

In way of explanation, it is proposed to designate one day each semester as a time when elections to the honorary societies will be publicly announced and when the entire student body will be invited to listen to some speaker of note who will discuss some phase of scholarship.

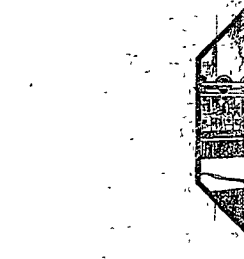
