## SET OF BY-LAWS FOR HONOR SOCIETY COUNCIL

Organization Adopts Code With Two Amendments—Election Of Officers

The set of by-laws for Penn State's Honor Society Council as published in a recent edition of the COLLEGIAN was adopted with two amendments at a meeting of the Honor Society Council held in Dean M. A. Knight's office last Tuesday evening. The first step in the organization of the Honor Council was the election of officers for the Council. Dr. S. W. Fletcher, Head of the Department of Horticulture, was elected chairman of the Council for the coming year, with Lawrence S. Gross '22, as secretary.

The amendments as adopted at the meeting were as follows: To be eligible for representation in the Honor Society Council, a society must conform to the following standards: First, The basis of membership in the society shall be high scholastic standing, but not necessarily that alone. The members of the society must be drawn from the upper fifth of the class in average grade.

Second, Elections to Honor Societies shall take place not earlier than the second semester of the prospective Junior year, but one Junior may be elected in the first semester of his Junior year. A distinction is drawn between under-graduate Honor Societies which elect earlier than the second semester of the Junior year and may have social features, and societies which elect near the end of the student's course and in which social features are incidental.

Third, The determination as to scholarship, only shall be in the hands of a faculty committee of the society.

One of the important duties of the Honor Society Council shall be to cooperate with the Senate Committee on academic standards in the observance of Scholarship Day. It is planned to hold the first Scholarship Day some time next October. At that time, the College will be addressed by some distinguished personage and the elections to the various Honor Societies and scholarship awards will be announced. The Honor Society Council will award scholarship medals to the members of the sophomore and junior classes at that time who have attained high scholastic records. About fifty bronze medals for this purpose have been donated by an alumnus of the College.

## AG EXTENSION DEPT. IS ORGANIZING BOY'S CLUBS

In co-operation with the Forest County Improvement Association, the Agricultural Extension Department is fostering the introduction of better farming methods through the formation of boy's clubs. It is planned to have every business man of Tionesta buy a bushel of disease-free seed potatoes and give them to a farm lad of the club for seed purposes. At the end of the season, the boy will return to the business man potatoes of equal value to the seed potatoes he received earlier in the spring.

By having the business man take dinner with the boy and his family at least once during the summer and by holding a banquet in the fall in which the business man is host to the boy, it is hoped to induce more familiar relationships between the people of the town and the farms and so stimulate the business of the county and possibly bring about the greater development of the natural and agricultural resources of Forest county.

## OPTIONAL CLASS ATTENDANCE FAVORED AT TRINITY COLLEGE

A movement has been introduced at Trinity College favoring optional class attendance, and several other colleges are taking up the idea. The upholders of this movement hold that as long as a student is above passing grade he should be permitted to attend classes at his own discretion, but as soon as he falls below grade he should be compelled to attend regularly.

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## NEW CATALOGUES WILL BE READY BY MAY 15

Many Changes and Improvements Noticeable in 1922-23 College Bulletin

First copies of the new general catalogue of the college were received by the Registrar this week and a number of very desirable changes and improvements are noticeable. The catalogue was printed this year by the H. C. Dunmore Company of Altoona.

Among the changes that have been noted is the revision of the General Statement, particularly the parts dealing with the history of the college and with finances. The history has been covered in complete fashion being built up in chronological arrangement from the founding of the college in 1855 to the present academic year.

This year's catalogue includes subjects for graduate study for the first time and may properly be termed the first step toward a graduate school. A separate bulletin covering graduate study is now in the hands of the printer and will cover the subject more in detail.

The general list of faculty names before each actual has been done away with and instead, the names are listed under the various departments with the departmental head at the top. Whenever possible, the name of the instructor has been placed after the course which he teaches, thus enabling the students and others to know in advance just who are the instructors for given courses. Another convenience to students will be the listing of the personnel of the various administrative offices of the college, together with the names of the secretaries to the various Deans.

The Registrar has announced that

there will be no catalogues available for general distribution until after noon on Monday, May 15th, after which time, students may receive a copy by calling at the Registrar's office.

## NEW CATTLE BARN CORNER STONE LAID

The exercises coincident to the laying of the cornerstone for the new beef cattle barn on Ag Hill were held in the Stock Judging Pavilion Thursday afternoon. Due to the rain which fell during the day it was found impossible to conduct all of the exercises on the site of the new barn. However, the spectators endured the rain for a few minutes for the laying of the cornerstone.

The ceremonies were presided over by Dean R. L. Watts. Addresses were made by Prof. W. H. Tomhave, head of the Department of Animal Husbandry, the Hon. Fred Rasmussen, head of the State Department of Agriculture, MacVill in Hoopes, Wilmington, Delaware, and President John M. Thomas.
