There are four ex-officio members, including Governor Sproul, President Thomas, who acts as secretary to the board, Superintendent of Public Instruction Thomas P. Fiegen and State Secretary of Agriculture Fred Baumbach. There are six members appointed by the Governor, nine elected by the Penn State general alumni association and twelve elected by delegates from agricultural, engineering and civic societies Judge H. Walton Altchell, of Pittsburgh, a graduate of the college, is president of the Board and James G. White, also an alumnus, of New York City, is vice-president. The board is vested by the State to operate and control of the college, its development and policies.

With respect to the financial support of the Pennsylvania State College, it is only necessary to say that it exists now and always in its original condition upon certain stated Federal appropriations and what funds could be secured from each session of the Pennsylvania State Legislature. Details of these laws and acts are given in the College General Information section under the title of "History" which begins on page 17 of the catalog. Every student should make himself familiar with the facts set forth in this history, and should take this copy of the catalog along home with him when he returns for vacation.
