1921 MET. ENGINEERS ON TWO WEEKS' TRIP

The members of the 1921 class in Metallurgical Engineering of the School of Mines, left State College Wednesday afternoon June 13th for a two weeks inspection trip to the iron and steel plants at Johnstown, Latrobe and Pittsburgh. The party, in charge of Professor O. A. Knight of the Department of Metallurgy, will study all the principal processes of steel manufacture from one to various finished products and will also visit a number of plants of allied industries such as by-product coke plants, zinc smelters, etc. In addition, conferences will be held with a number of plant executives and technical men concerning the relations of the School of Mines to the metallurgical industries of the state and plans will be laid for a more extended conference which is to be held in State College in the fall.
