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CAMPAIGN BACKED BY STUDENTS OF SUMMER SESSION

Fifteen Hundred Men and Women Pass Resolutions Favoring a "Greater Penn State"

CAMPAIGN OFFICERS ARE ELECTED BY STUDENTS

At the Summer Session mass meeting held in the Auditorium last Wednesday evening, the summer students of Penn State showed their willingness to get behind the Penn State Emergency Building Fund Campaign and PUSII— with the regular Penn State students and alumni.

Dean Chambers explained the three-fold purpose of the coming campaign to be (1)—the securing of deserved recognition for the Pennsylvania State University, (2)—the raising of \$2,000,000 for necessary student health and welfare buildings, and (3)—the creating of a powerful sentiment in favor of Penn State in every Pennsylvania county so that the State Legislature would be compelled to properly provide for the maintenance and growth of the State University into an institution of 40,000 men and women.

The Dean pointed out that as teachers in Pennsylvania the summer students would be particularly interested in the movement for a greater Penn State. With Pennsylvania State University as the capstone of the free educational system of the Commonwealth, and with the expansion of the institution, many additional courses could be offered in summer, while those already offered could be made more complete.

RESIGNED HERE AT END OF LAST SUMMER

In response to a note recently sent to Dr. Edwin R. Smith, Director of the Summer Session at Penn State until last year, now head of the Department of Mathematics at the Iowa State College of Agriculture and Mechanic Arts, at Ames, Iowa, the editor of the "Summer Collegian" has received the following letter, which will be read with great interest, not only by students of former summer sessions and friends of Dr. Smith, but as well as by the students of the present session.

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DR. BRIGGS TO GIVE SERIES OF TWO LECTURES

Professor of Education in Columbia University to Speak Here Next Monday and Tuesday

SPEAKER IS DIRECTOR OF JUNIOR HIGH COURSE HERE

Dr. Thomas Henry Briggs, of Columbia University, New York City, will give a series of two lectures in the Open Air Theatre next Monday and Tuesday evenings at seven o'clock. Dr. Briggs, who is director of the two weeks' intensive course dealing with the Junior High School, has announced the subjects of his two lectures as "Appreciation" and on Tuesday evening, "Some Further Values of Literature."

This speaker was born in North Carolina about forty-five years ago. He received his Bachelor of Arts degree in 1896 from Wake Forest College, which institution gave him the degree of Doctor of Literature in 1919. He also studied two years at the University of Chicago, and received his Doctor of Philosophy degree from Columbia University in 1920.

After several years of teaching in public schools and academies, Dr. Briggs became professor of English in the Johns Hopkins University, Baltimore, Maryland. After ten years as teacher of English in the Eastern (Illinois) State Normal School, he went to Teachers College, Columbia University, New York, and has been professor of education there since 1920.

ACTIVE INTEREST TAKEN IN ORIENT BY SPEAKER

"China Today" is the subject of a lecture to be given on Saturday evening at seven o'clock in the Open Air Theatre at State College, Pa., by Dr. Paul Monroe, of Columbia University, New York City. Dr. Monroe, who is a native of Indiana, was educated at Franklin College, the University of Chicago, and the University of Heidelberg, as well as receiving the honorary degree of Doctor of Laws from the University of Peking in 1914 and from Franklin College in 1915. He began his teaching career as a fellow in sociology at the University of Chicago, and then went to Teachers College, Columbia University, New York City, where he is now an instructor in history. In 1917, he became adjunct professor of history of education, then professor, and then director of the School of Education, a position he has held since 1915.

PENN STATE HOLDS CLASS IN PSYCHOLOGY AT MT. ALTO

Dean Chambers spent Friday and Saturday of last week on a trip to Mt. Alto, where a class in educational psychology is being held. This summer session is the first of its kind in the Department of Educational Extension of Penn State. Former Superintendent, Dr. Lynton, of Altoona, is in charge of this class. The class consists of school teachers, with several ministers in addition. It is probable that summer classes will be established there permanently, the subjects to be offered being education, psychology, and nature study.

1,400 PENNSYLVANIANS ENROLLED AT COLUMBIA
