

RUSSIAN REFUGEE AIDS PENN STATE

Graduate of Class of 1912, After Three Years in Russia, Succeeds in Returning to America

THRILLING EXPERIENCES MARK HIS TRIP ABROAD

In return for the part that Penn State played in saving his life when he was caught in the midst of the Bolshevik revolution in Russia, Thomas Srednik, a book-seller of Philadelphia, and graduate of the Pennsylvania State College in 1912, has pledged to raise \$2,000,000 for the Russian refugees.

A fellow alumnus of Srednik told the following story of him: "In 1917 Srednik, with his wife and child, was living in Petrograd. He held a good position in a manufacturing plant and was rapidly rising to leadership in his profession as a chemist. Then came the Bolshevik revolution. Seeing the danger, he sent his wife and child across Siberia to Japan and then to America. Soon he also was forced to flee. He sent his money to London, and with a nondescript horde of refugees he tried desperately to leave Russia. The next three years he but dimly remembers.

COURSES IN GEOGRAPHY ARE PROVING POPULAR

Geography—what it is, and how to teach it—is one of the leading features of the course at the college summer session this year. He explained how it would be necessary to turn away hundreds of teachers each summer if new buildings and other facilities were not provided for the Summer Session students who will benefit by the new buildings to be provided for in the coming campaign, just as will the regular students, Dean Chambers pointed out. Many more students can be accommodated, and the opening of more residence groups to summer students will mean the maximum of comfort at the minimum of cost.

The rejection of one thousand qualified applicants a year now necessary because of inadequate state support could be prevented by expansion to a state university like the great universities of Ohio, Illinois, and Wisconsin, and WIERDAS. A campaign for a \$2,000,000 Building Fund to be devoted to health, social and other welfare buildings, has been inaugurated; therefore be it RESOLVED, That the Summer Session students of the Pennsylvania State College, in meeting assembled, unqualifiedly endorse the plan for the expansion of the college, and be it further RESOLVED, That the Summer Session students urge that every proper means be exerted to achieve the change of the College to the State University, and be it further RESOLVED, That the Summer Session students pledge their fullest loyalty and support to the \$2,000,000 Building Fund Campaign, and be it further RESOLVED, That copies of this resolution be forwarded to the President of the college and the President of the Board of Trustees.
