PENNS' CAVE IS ONE OF NATURE'S WONDERS

No Summer Session student should leave Penn State without making a trip to the famous Penns' Cave down in Penns' Valley, about eighteen miles from the college. This cavern is one of the beaut spots of Central Pennsylvania, and it is well worth a visit as any one can testify who has been there.

The cavern extends underground about a quarter of a mile and the formations of stalagmites and stalactites are made visible by the aid of a powerful searchlight. An interesting legend concerning the discovery of the cave and the tragedy connected with it is obtainable in booklet form on the grounds.

Excursions have been planned to Penns' Cave each Saturday morning and afternoon, the time of leaving being 8:00 a. m. and 1:30 p. m. The cars leave the west end of Old Main Building. All wishing to go on these trips must likewise sign up at the summer session office before five o'clock of the preceding Friday.

COLLEGE VARIETY OF WHEAT TO YIELD BIG RETURNS THIS YEAR

The wheat yield on 10,000 acres in Pennsylvania is expected to show an increase of 50,000 bushels this summer as the direct result of the wheat seed "Pennsylvania 11" developed at the Pennsylvania State College a few years ago. Announcement was made at the college by Professor C. P. Noll, of the School of Agriculture, that this number of acres of the new variety of wheat are now being harvested, and that the average increase yield over standard varieties of wheat will be five bushels an acre.

If the more than a million acres of soil that are sown with wheat in this state were sown entirely with Pennsylvania 11, it is estimated that the increase in value of the state's wheat crop would exceed \$2,000,000.

Pennsylvania 11 is a selection of Fall-planted wheat from a single head selected on one of the college farms in 1909. It came as the result of over 1200 selections made under the direction of Professor Noll. In 1918 the college distributed 11 bushels of seed of this type, in 1919, 40 bushels, and in 1920, 471 bushels. In the fall of 1921, 2,500 bushels of college Pennsylvania 11 seed were sown, and it is this crop that is now being harvested.

SUCCESS MARKS OPENING OF "EVERGREENS" PROJECT

A large crowd of enthusiastic swimmers and dancers attended the opening day of the "Evergreens" swimming pool and dancing pavilion just a little below town last Saturday afternoon and evening. Both structures have just been completed. The swimming pool is large, clean and commodious, and will fill a long-felt want in this community. The dance pavilion floor is roomy and well polished, and dancers there will not find any obstructing posts in the middle of the floor. In connection with the pavilion there is a tea room at which refreshments can be obtained.

It is the plan of the management to have the swimming pool open daily, running from one to eight p. m. on Mondays, Wednesdays, Fridays, and Saturdays, and from one to six p. m. on Tuesday, Thursday, and Saturday. Dances will be run three evenings a week, on Tuesday, Thursday, and Saturday, from eight to twelve.
