### CONFERENCE PLANNED FOR SCHOOL SUPERINTENDENTS

A conference of school superintendents will be held at Penn State, beginning Monday, August 14th, and ending Friday, August 18th. An interesting and instructive program has been arranged, and an unusually large number of Pennsylvania school men is expected to attend.

The program includes an address of welcome by President Thomas, a response by Superintendent C. D. Dickory, of Allegheny county, and the discussion of various educational problems and topics. The evening programs, which are those of the regular summer session, will consist of lectures, as follows: "American Scholarship," by former President E. D. Sparks, an address by Dr. Albert Lindsay Rowland, Director of the Teacher Bureau, for the State Department of Public Instruction, "The Superintendent's Problem," by Mr. Ernest C. Hartwell, Superintendent of Schools at Buffalo, N. Y., and an address by Dr. Lee L. Driver, Director of Rural Education for the State Department of Public Instruction.

### GIRL GRADUATES SELECT GREAT VARIETY OF JOBS

The sixty-two young women who were graduated from Penn State in June have selected ten different lines of work, according to the vocational preference list prepared by Dean Margaret A. Knight. Three girls selected farming as a vocation, while three others took up chemical laboratory work. Two are following interior decorating, two went in for dramatics, and four selected social service. There is a quartet of dietitians, three took up graduate studies, two entered Y. W. C. A. work, and one tackled the business field. The others will become school teachers, seventeen in home economics and two in physical education, with nineteen in miscellaneous teaching branches.

The potato growers of the state have become so enthusiastic over the project that they expect to have their entire fund raised by August 25th, when ground will be broken for the hospital. The first \$100,000 of the proposed fund of \$150,000 has been pledged by the counties of the state, with the remaining counties still to be heard from. Lehigh county growers have sent a challenge to those in other counties by offering to over-subscribe any other county.

(Continued from first page) had much of the tragic in it and which had been conspicuous for self-sacrificing devotion to the Republican organization. Starting life as a farmer's son it was his ambition to occupy a seat in the United States Senate. He shaped his political career to that end. When finally he reached the goal, in health had griped him. On October 21st last he went to Washington to be sworn in to take the oath of office as the successor by appointment of Senator Philander C. Knox. His lifelong friends, led by Governor William C. Sproul, filled the galleries of the Senate chamber when he took the oath of office. He returned to Philadelphia the same day and did not return to Washington for many weeks. He made a second trip to Washington, but was unable to remain there. In all he spent scarcely a full day on the floor of the Senate. Senator Crow will be buried tomorrow afternoon. Services will be held at Chest Hill and interment will be made in Oak Grove Cemetery, nearby.

### SIX WEEKS' COURSE IN MINING COMES TO END

The third annual six weeks' short course in mining at Penn State comes to an end today, when the thirty-five men who have been enrolled leave for their homes. The course has been very successful, and in the enrollment have been ten or eleven men who have been back for the second time and one who has returned for the third time. The work has been both theoretical and practical and has been designed to prepare men for examinations for fire-boys and mine foreman jobs, and to fit those who have already fulfilled these requirements, for higher positions. This course becomes of intense interest at the present time, when one remembers the acute situation which exists in the coal regions on account of the striking miners.

The enrollment for this work has been approximately fifty students, and the course has been under the direction of Dr. Thomas H. Briggs, of Teachers College, Columbia University, assisted by Mr. B. W. Dill, of the Department of Education at Penn State. During the progress of the course various phases of Junior High School work were taken up, including the beginnings and spread of the movement, the needs of its pupils, its program of studies, and the conditions which produced the demand for reorganization.

(Continued from first page) and chairman has become too much for one man to handle. President Thomas addressed the entire student body last evening on the university project, and his plan for the

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expansion of the Pennsylvania State College. He summarized the progress made since the organization of the campaign, and the prospects for its successful conclusion. This was the first time that President Thomas had an opportunity to meet the Summer Session students in a body since he returned from his vacation.

Since the mass meeting held on July 25th, many developments have occurred in the movement for a Greater Penn State, chief among which were the organization of the advisory committee for the campaign, a contribution of \$1,000 to the Potato Growers' Hospital Fund by J. L. Reitz, probably the largest potato grower in the central part of the state, the fulfillment of its quota by Adams county, and the organization of alumni in nearly all the counties of the state. Campaign organizations have also been perfected in New York City, Washington, D. C., Baltimore, Md., and Wilmington, Del.
