The potato growers of the state, desiring to take a special share in the campaign, themselves elected to subscribe the necessary funds for a new Penn State Hospital...

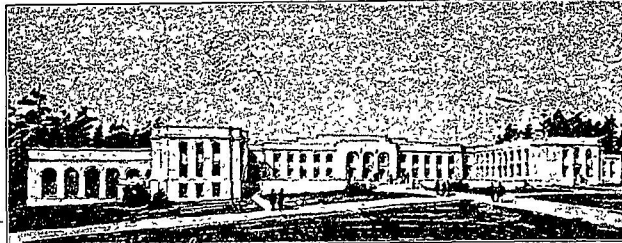
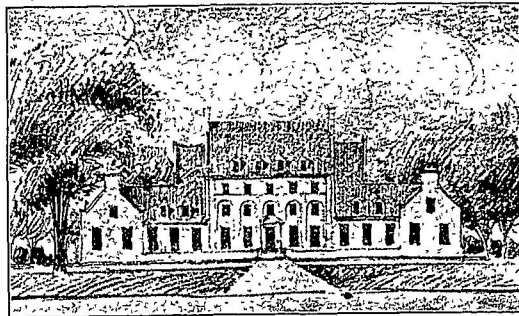
Work is progressing rapidly on the erection of a new beef cattle barn to pair off with the handsome dairy barn on Agricultural Hill...

Thousands Attend Burial of Member of Penn State Board of Trustees

Senator William D. Crow, a member of the Pennsylvania State College Board of Trustees who died at his country home at Chalk Hill near Uniontown on Wednesday morning of last week, was buried last Saturday afternoon...

Thousands of persons in many walks of life friends of the late Senator, assembled on the lawn in front of the Crow summer home at Chalk Hill and bowed their heads in silent tribute to Dr. W. Hamilton Spence, of the First Presbyterian Church of Uniontown, concluded the funeral services...

Following the services, the funeral procession, consisting of more than 200 automobiles, was formed on the national pike. The procession was headed by Fayette Lodge No. 228, Free and Accepted Masons...

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20,000 BENEFITTED BY COLLEGE DURING YEAR

"Service" to the people of Pennsylvania is the keynote of the work at the Pennsylvania State College, as is shown from records kept during the past college year. According to these, a total of almost 20,000 men and women throughout Pennsylvania and nearby states were reached by the college with some kind of actual collegiate instruction...

The desire for spreading the campus of State College to all parts of the state in this year responsible for this great showing. Of the 19,091 people who received instruction of various kinds during the year, 13,991 are classed as extra-mural students. They were enrolled in nonresident teacher training classes, extension courses and in correspondence courses, many of them receiving actual college credit towards a degree...

A feature of this university grade work attracted to several hundred Pennsylvania communities was the installation of educational extension classes for school teachers. A total enrollment of 1,642 was achieved in the first year this work was tried. There were 4,300 in engineering extension classes and 800 in similar work among the mines of the state.

Specialized teacher training in home economics, mining and the trades and industries was given to 621 men and women. Correspondence courses were given at practically no cost to 7,355 men and women in agriculture, education, engineering and home economics.

(Continued from first page) Education, English, French, German, History, Industrial Art, Latin, Mathematics, Psychology, and Spanish. New courses will be added from time to time when called for by a sufficient number of students. Practically all of the Liberal Arts courses offered in the Summer Session may be either continued or taken from the beginning in correspondence. Both entrance and college credit may be obtained.

"Students intending to pursue correspondence study courses should, if possible, consult instructors regarding the courses which are available and fill out the registration blank some time during the Summer Session. Instruction begins at the time of the opening of the regular college year in September. Registration will be received at any time during the first semester."
