\$250,000 RAISED IN STUDENT CAMPAIGN

Although \$300,000 was set as the goal for the drive, the campaign committee considers the drive a success because, as it was pointed out after the campaign was started, if every student

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new enrolled at Penn State were to pledge \$100 towards the fund, the total could not get very much over \$250,000. The fact that \$229,276 of this had been pledged by Thursday noon, and the amount raised at the freshmen class meeting Thursday night bids fair to overtop the \$250,000 mark, shows that the student body of Penn State has entered whole-heartedly into the drive and has given the general campaign for health and welfare buildings the desired approval that was needed before it was presented to the citizens of Pennsylvania.

development of a Nittany machine of sufficient strength to pull through the approaching games with Syracuse, Navy, Carnegie Tech, Penn and Pitt. The coaches have been working the men hard this week and are gradually offsetting the handicap which they faced this fall owing to the loss of fourteen members of last year's varsity squad, eleven of whom were letter winners. This is being made possible only by the fine spirit that is shown by every member of the squad. If the men escape further injury in tomorrow's contest, the Nittany Lion will be hitting its stride in a week or two.

Visitors Hard Fighters
The game with Lebanon Valley will not be a walk-away by any means. The Annville collegians have a big squad this year, including numerous veterans

and a number of new men. Some of the old-timers have had difficulty in retaining their positions as a few of the new men have been showing up exceptionally well.

Lebanon Valley has been playing better football this fall than it has for a number of years. In the game with Army on September thirtieth, the cadets had a hard time beating the down-state grid men. They pitted their first-string substitutes against the plucky Annville lads, who were outwitted, but the soldiers had stubborn opposition and pierced the defense of the Pennsylvanians for only two touchdowns. Last week, Lebanon Valley emerged from the struggle with Georgetown on the short end of a 19 to 0 score, but not before putting up a fight worthy of any college team.

Lebanon Valley will probably start the game tomorrow with Honan at quarterback, Krause at left half, Wolfe at right half, and Muchinski, who starred at West Point and Georgetown, at fullback position. Frack will hold down the center berth with Beck and Lenster at guards, and Danker and Whistler at tackle positions. Danker is a stone-wall on defense and exceptionally fast on offensive work. Smith at left end and Clarkin at right end complete the probable line-up of the Annville aggregation.

Palm Will Start Game
Bezdek will most likely start the same team tomorrow that opened the game with Gettysburg last Saturday, with the exception that Palm will hold down the quarterback job instead of Patton. "Mike's" ankle is now in good shape

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and he can be counted on to make his presence felt in tomorrow's contest. The remaining members of the backfield will probably be Singer at fullback, Simmons at right half, and Wilson at the left halfback position.

Sehuster and McMahon will hold down the tackle jobs, with Hamilton and Delek at left and right guards respectively and Captain "Newsy" Houtz at center. Frank will play the left end position and McCoy will start at right end. It is likely that Hufford will break into the line-up at his regular position during the game, as he has recovered from his recent injury sufficiently to allow him to take part in the contest if necessary.

Both are more or less untried; both have suffered the loss of good varsity members; and both have reputations to maintain in the soccer world. Inasmuch as the Nittany Institution is endeavoring to arrange a game with the University of Toronto, Lehigh's recent conqueror, additional interest is placed on the outcome of the struggle with the Bethlehem team.

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
