Harvard in the first game of the year, holding the bigger and heavier Crimson team to a 20 to 0 score on foreign soil. The plucky New England boys were able to get in eight first downs more than Harvard, and during the third period of the game, after taking the ball away from Harvard when the Crimson stood eight yards from the Vermonters' Territory, carried the ball

to the enemy's thirty-yard line, indicating a driving power not in agreement with a weak backfield. Morey's progress also made a creditable showing against Williams, but the game with Dartmouth last Saturday revealed a decided weakness in the over-head attack of the New Englanders, and as a result, advance by the aerial route will not be tried to a great extent in tomorrow's contest with the Nittany Lion.

Hamilton at Center

The Penn State line-up for tomorrow's contest is changed somewhat due to Captain Heitz being out with a bad shoulder. "Bill" Hamilton, who has played a splendid game at guard in all of the games this season, will appear at the pivot position, while Plock, a member of last year's freshman team, will substitute for "Bill" at left guard. Hufford will be back at his old post at right end and Frank will hold down the other end position. The team will be greatly strengthened with Hufford back in the game today.

Backfield Will Be Unchanged

Schuster and McMahon will fill the tackle berths, while "Dutch" Bedenk may be counted upon to play his usual dependable game at right guard. The backfield will be composed of the same men who finished the game with Lebanon Valley last Saturday. Palm will hold down the quarterback job, with Wilson at left half, Kratz at right half, and Singer at fullback.

the year, and because it has been deemed advisable to wait until spring to hold the annual Poverty Day, the Council has set October twenty-eighth for the date of the tie-up scrap. The date of Poverty Day will be announced later. There will be no home football game at this time, which is practically the only Saturday when it is practicable to hold a class scrap of any kind. A committee consisting of H. E. Park '23 chairman, L. L. Bailey '23, Shultz '23, G. W. Lehr '24, and H. A. Sayford '23.

Hereafter all proceedings of the Student Tribunal will be published in the Penn State Collegian. This decision was reached because of the apparent lack of interest that the student body has been taking in the work of this body. The names of the guilty parties, their cases and the punishment meted out will be reported.

Revision of Customs

A committee was appointed to con-

sider the advisability of revising the set of customs as they are now printed in the freshman hand book, with the idea in mind of discarding all those customs which have fallen into disuse and which are out-of-date and of creating any new customs that are needed and which might prove of benefit to the college. The committee that will do this work includes A. J. Musser '23, chairman, I. S. Adams '23, C. Harro '23, R. A. Neagely '23, W. H. Payne '23, E. D. Shive '23, R. E. Longacre '24, E. P. Kerr '25 and W. B. Oliver '24.

No Special Trains

President Lane then presented a special train proposition that had been submitted by the Division Manager of the Pennsylvania Railroad. A special train could be secured to move from Leominster at six o'clock in the morning of the Penn State-Penn game but it would have to leave Philadelphia within twenty-four hours of that time according to recent traffic regulations. Also, a price reduction of fifty percent could be made on the tickets providing 500 students bought passages. A reduction of forty percent would be given for 400 passengers; other rates to be given on this sliding scale. The entire responsibility of collecting fares, or levying extra assessments in case the required number of passengers was

not secured, and of transferring the money to the railroad would fall upon the Student Council. This proposition was rejected by the council.

The application made by Carnegie Tech for permission to sell "The Pup-pet" on November eleventh was granted subject to the restriction that the sale shall not start till the second half of the football game. This is the practice at most of the colleges and was thought to be a fair consideration.

Post-office Conditions

The conditions that now exist at the local post-office were severely criticized by various members of the Council and a committee was appointed by President Lane to make investigations and to report.

President Kerr of the sophomore class asked permission to hold a sophomore hop as was held last year. Permission was readily granted. No definite time has been set for the Hop.

Thanksgiving Petition

The advisability of petitioning for a Thanksgiving vacation was the last item of business discussed. Due to the

present state law that a certain number of school days must be held, it was thought best that the opinion of the officials of the college should be sought first before definite action be started. Many arguments were advanced both in favor of and against petitioning. In order to bring about immediate action a committee was appointed to interview the President, to report to Student Council, and to draw up the petition if it is found advisable to do so. This committee consists of E. D. Shive, '23, chairman, I. S. Adams '23, W. C. Lebow '23, M. H. Palm '24 and E. P. Kerr '25.

Election of a junior to the Student Tribunal resulted in the choice of H. R. Johnson.
