(Continued from first page.) starting; they are discouraged and sick at heart, their families have been wiped out, their fortune taken away, and many of them are still suffering from weakness gained in the trenches fighting the Germans. Worst of all, they have lost their faith in God and man. Might is apparent right. Nothing matters but to take care of one's self. They are drifting fast into a materialism and the philosophy of life as dangerous for the world as that which led Germany to defy the world. "Now Captain, you go and tell your hard-boiled guy to picture himself as having had breakfast only for a year or two, as wearing the same clothes he had six years ago, as sleeping down in Slim's theatre without heat or light, and then ask him to picture to himself how he would feel if from across the water there came a decent meal a day, an overcoat and firewood for the theatre. It is not difficult to imagine the resulting feeling. The hearts of these Russians with their great spiritual capacity are broken with gratitude and returning affection."

### VARIOUS COUNTY CLUBS PLAN CHRISTMAS DANCES

#### Many Clubs to Run Annual Dances on Business Basis for Welfare Campaign

Christmas dances will be the principal feature for most of the county clubs of Penn State over the coming vacation period. Most of the clubs have committees at work arranging the details and plans are being rapidly formulated.

The Wayne County Club will hold its annual affair at Honesdale in the State Armory on December twenty-seventh, while the Lancaster Club will hold its dance on the same date at the Hotel Brunswick at Lancaster. The Beaver County Club dance will also be held the evening of the twenty-seventh at Beaver Falls, the Keystone Strangers furnishing the music for the occasion. The Pottstown Club has announced its seventh annual dance for the twenty-ninth in the I. O. O. F. Hall at Pottstown, the Black and White Orchestra of York being engaged for this affair. Delaware County students will stage their dance on the thirtieth of December at the Twentieth Century Club, at Lansdowne, with Arch Morrison's celebrated orchestra supplying the music. The second annual dance of the Butler County Club will be put on at the Masonic Hall at Butler, the evening of the thirtieth, and the Cumberland County Club will put on a dance before Christmas on December twenty-first, at Carlisle, in Hurler Hall. The Banjo-Sax Orchestra of Harrisburg will supply the music for this dance.

Most of the clubs are planning to run their dances on a business basis and turn the proceeds over to the Campaign. The plan being tried out in this instance is that the students and their instructors have dinner together at these various places and after dinner, discuss matters pertaining to the subject discussed was "The History of Botanical Work at State College and in Pennsylvania."

The plan was started at the beginning of this term, and it has proved quite popular with both students and faculty.

(Continued from first page.) establish it as an annual event. The Club has an enviable record which has been established by past performances, and from all indications the members of this year's Club will continue the same high quality concerts

as before. The activities of the Club have been quite extensive and reach from coast to coast along the Santa Fe route to California. The Glee Club has also been represented in distant parts of the world by the Varsity Quartet which made a trip to the Pacific Coast in 1914 and sang at the World's Fair. Many newspaper comments followed this performance and credited the Club and Quartet with having the best entertainment ever offered on the Santa Fe Heading Room Concert Program.

In 1912, 1913, and in 1920 the Varsity Quartet sailed to the Panama Canal Zone and staged concerts in numerous of the United States Government. During the month of March each year the Club competes in the Intercollegiate Glee Club contest held in New York City. About eleven of the leading colleges and universities are entered in this competition, among the most notable being Harvard and Yale. The competition for the annual cup is exceedingly keen in this contest, and Penn State has several times been honorably mentioned. This is a distinction well worth attaining, as Harvard and Yale have been the strongest contenders for the cup in past years. Before this contest the songsters make a ten-day tour through the New England States.

The history of the Penn State Glee Club dates back to the accession to the Directorship in the Department of Music by Mr. C. C. Robinson in 1912, who in a short time, built up the reputation of the Club to its present high standard. Mr. Robinson left Penn State at the close of the last college year to assume his new duties as Dean of Music at Ohio State University. He

was succeeded this year by Mr. Richard W. Grant, of Boston, Massachusetts, who has a wide reputation in musical circles, and who is striving to have the Club surpass its past record. Many concerts are given annually throughout the state, and are usually drawing cash for large social gatherings of Penn State alumni and friends. Towns in which the Club has created a favorable impression during the past three years include Titusville, North East, Jamesport, Elizabethtown, Lock Haven, Johnstown, Altoona, Indiana, Philadelphia, New York City, and Pittsburgh.

The Penn State Glee Club furnishes at least three regular concerts on the Penn State campus each year. One is Pennsylvania Day in November, a mid-winter concert, and another at Pennsylvania Day program was an epoch-making one in that it was the first time that the Club filled the entire program without the assistance of outside soloists.

The mid-winter concert this year will be given on Saturday evening, February third, and will be considered as preparation for the New England trip and the Intercollegiate contest. The program offered this year are of the usual high standard, combining difficult and serious numbers with the lighter variety of music. The quartet, assisted by several soloists of merit, will work in conjunction with the Glee Club orchestra to make these programs highly enjoyable. The personnel of the Glee Club consists of forty-four members who are selected annually by competitive trials similar to those conducted by the Varsity Quartet.
