GLEE CLUB ASSOCIATION CHOOSES PRIZE SONG

Wendessohn's "Hunter's Fare- well" is Selected for Contest to be Held March Third

New York, January 8.—The Hunter's Farewell by Wendessohn which has been chosen as the Prize Song in the Intercollegiate Glee Club Contest, to be held at Carnegie Hall on March third, 1928, presents sufficient difficulties to test the best trained club in the country.

In last year's contest, Harvard won the first leg on the new University Glee Club Cup with Yale a close second, but in the next contest Harvard must look to her laurels, for the other colleges are out for blood.

The Glee Club contests were organized in 1911 by Albert F. Pickernell, President of the Intercollegiate Musical Corporation; four clubs entering the first contest that year. In 1923, nine years later, eleven clubs will compete in New York City, eight in Chicago, and eight in San Francisco.

(Continued from first page.) Two point advantage over their opponents.

Another goal was made by Gerhardt and a successful foul by Reed put the score up to 8-4 before Syracuse again scored, when a field goal and a foul by Gallivan made the count 8 to 7. With the score 9 to 7 after a foul, Shair with a sharp struggle under the basket dropped the ball through, Penn State was then held scoreless while Syracuse added two fouls and a field goal to their score, bringing the count again nearly even, 11 to 10.

Second Half The second period of the game opened with the Orange representatives fighting desperately to gain the lead which they were so close to during the first half. Neither side was able to score a point for several minutes after the opening of the half, both goals being endangered several times with attempted baskets.

Again Reed was responsible for enlarging the Penn State count, by throwing four more fouls before the Syracuse tossers were able to find the basket, making the score 25 to 11.

Noakes, who was substituted for Pasce, was the first man to score for the visitors in this half. His two fouls and a field goal by Trout, substituted for Gallivan, was the last scoring which the Syracuse team was able to negotiate, giving them a total of 16 points. A foul, followed by a field goal by Reed, another by Koehler and the final two pointer by Reed from the side line, ended the game, with the score 32 to 15.
