short time the "regulars" came back with a punch that swept the resistance of the second team aside. During the fourth quarter the game took on the aspect of a slaughter with the first team carrying the ball over the goal line time and again. Shanks Gets Touchdown. At the beginning of the second half Shanks, receiving the ball from the kick-off on the forty yard line, carried it through the first team for a touchdown. The second team continued its offense when the ball was put in play again. On the fourth down the "seconds" were forced to kick and Palm was tackled on his twenty yard line. A few minutes later he was forced to punt when Onyx blocked a forward pass. The second team could not make a first down, however, and on the next play Palm ran the ball from the fifty yard line for a touchdown. Long Runs Feature. Wilson started the last quarter by running the ball back to the ten yard line. Light and Palm then carried it over the goal line in two plays. A few minutes later the first team garnered seven more points when Johnson brought the ball within striking distance of the goal line by a long run to the fifteen yard line. The second team received the kick-off but was unable to advance the ball for a first down. Onyx punted and Palm ran the ball from the sixty yard line for another touchdown. On the next kick-off Johnson kept up the good work by running through the second team for a touchdown with Harry Wilson trotting along as interference. The final tally of the game came when Palm threw a long forward from the sixty yard line. "Haw" Frank received the pass on the forty yard line and ambled across the goal line. It was a long pass and a pretty catch. The Line-up. The line-up of the first team was unchanged in the first half. Frank, Schuster, Michalski, Gray, Bedenk, Prevost and Artel made up the line and Palm, Wilson, Johnson and Light were the quartet that composed the backfield. At the end of the first half Faulkner replaced Artel who left practice early. The second team line-up at the start of the game was the same as it had been all during last week. Faulkner, Onyx, McCann, Murray, Boyd, Ellwood and Anderson were on the line and Wentz, Patton, Shanks and Buckley made up the backfield. In the second half Muckle went in at left end when Faulkner was moved up to the first team. McCann was compelled to leave the game after he had been hurt in a scrimmage.

NEW HOUSES ARE BUILT BY THREE FRATERNITIES

Sigma Phi Sigma, Theta Xi and Alpha Chi Sigma Expect To Occupy Buildings Soon

Three of the Greek letter fraternities of Penn State are at the present time actively engaged in putting up new houses which they will occupy in the near future. The Sigma Phi Sigma fraternity is building their house at the corner of Prospect Avenue and Locust Lane, the Theta Xi at the corner of Fairmount Avenue and Locust Lane, and the Alpha Chi Sigma at the south-west corner of Nittany and Pugh streets.

The Sigma Phi Sigma house will be a three story structure of colonial architecture, built of native limestone. It will be thirty-eight by eight-and-a-half feet in size with a two story deck porch running the entire length of the building. The front will be facing Prospect Avenue in order to take advantage of the view toward Mount Nittany.

On the first floor will be the club rooms and the dining room and on the second and third stories will be bed and study rooms to accommodate their 15-four members, with an alumni suit and guest room. It is planned to use several rooms for sleeping quarters only, although the dormitory system as a whole will not be followed.

The building was started on the first of June and it is expected to be completed about the first of January. It will be owned and controlled by the Alumni Association of the local chapter and will cost approximately forty thousand dollars. Two other chapters of the Sigma Phi Sigma fraternity, the Illinois and the California chapters have recently constructed new houses.

The Alpha Chi Sigma house will be a three story building constructed of native limestone and will be one hundred by forty feet in size. It will face Pugh street and will have a two story deck porch over the front entrance, following the old colonial style. The club room on the first floor will be divided into two rooms by a double fire-place. The new chapter house will have room for approximately thirty-six men. Work was begun on the building in May and it is expected to be completed in November.

The Theta Xi house at the corner of Fairmount Avenue and Locust Lane is being built in the colonial style using Pennsylvania Colonial Bond brick. The structure will face Locust Lane and will accommodate thirty-four men with extra room for guests. The building is being put up at an approximate cost of thirty-five thousand dollars by the Lambda Association of the Theta Xi fraternity. Work was started about June fifth and will be completed about November first.

PLANS BEING PREPARED FOR ENGINEERS' EXHIBIT

The Navy name, which is to be held on that day is expected to bring thousands of people through the Engineering buildings between the hours of nine and twelve on Saturday morning, October twentieth.

A considerable sum of money is going to be available from the Treasury of the Combined Engineering Society. This money will be apportioned out to the several societies in ratio of the membership of the department in the Combined Society. Last year, the lack of funds was a serious handicap in preparation for the event. This year will list all the individual exhibits in the order in which they will be seen as the visitors go through the various buildings, and will prove of great help to the guides. The art staff of the Penn State Engineer is designing a cover for the program.

The individual exhibits are being worked out in the departments, under the supervision of committees. NEW DORMITORIES ARE SOON READY FOR MEN

Although the work on the Watts Memorial Hall will not be entirely completed for two or three months, two units are expected to be ready for occupancy by the first week in October, and the third unit soon after. The rooms in the new dormitory will be entirely furnished by the college, including linen and blankets. A number of persons have been employed by the college to take care of the rooms and to see that they are kept orderly and clean in order that the students may have all the conveniences possible.

The Varsity Hall is being rushed as much as possible in order to get the roof on before the hard weather sets in. Both ends of the building are up, roof high but the center has to go a story and a half higher. The hall is expected to be finished in June and ready for occupancy next fall.
