

POULTRY SHOW IS STATE WIDE AFFAIR

Several Loving Cups Are Offered as Trophies—Entries Are Coming in Daily.

IS FIRST SHOW OF ITS KIND IN PENNSYLVANIA

With the opening day of the First State Standard Production Poultry Show but two weeks distant, the number of applications is mounting higher each day.

Almost two thousand premium lists have been distributed throughout the state within the last two weeks and commendations on these lists have been coming into the Poultry Husbandry department from all parts of the state.

As prizes for the best individual birds and the best exhibits of birds several beautiful loving cups and other handsome trophies have been offered. The largest of the cups is the one presented by the Penn State Poultry Club.

Entries for the show are coming in daily, and some of the best known poultrymen in the state have already sent in their fees. These men are the owners of the best birds in the state, and the class of competition promises to be of a high grade.

Committees Are Busy

The committees connected with the management and preparation of the show are hard at work preparing for the event. The committee headed by J. H. Armstrong, is in charge of the decoration of the Pavilion and has decided that the main decorations will consist of blue and white bunting strung from the beams to the center of the building.

This show, the second of its kind in the United States, and the first in the state of Pennsylvania, is expected to be an annual event hereafter. Besides being of inestimable value to the poultry man who enters fowls or sees the exhibits, the show will prove valuable to the college as it will attract visitors to Penn State that would not otherwise come.

DR. R. L. SACKETT SOON TO RETURN FROM ABROAD

President John M. Thomas has recently received a letter from Dr. R. L. Sackett, who has been on a trip abroad.

Dr. Sackett attended the annual convention of the British Association for the Advancement of Science and as the only American engineering delegate spoke on a large number of technical papers that were presented.

While in London he visited one of the new additions to the London water supply system and the great sewage treatment works at Crossness where important experimental work is being carried on.

Aside from his activities as delegate to the Association, Dean Sackett is much interested in English universities and technical schools. During his stay in England he made an extended tour of the leading schools of London, Liverpool, Birmingham, Manchester, Leeds and Sheffield.

RADIO CORRESPONDENCE COURSES ARE POPULAR

Instruction Will Be Supplemented by Lectures on Outstanding Amateur Problems

Correspondence courses in elementary and advanced radio, recently announced by the engineering extension department have proved instantly popular throughout the country.

"We have received," he said, "in the short period since the courses were announced, inquiries and enrollments from widely scattered sections of the country, ranging from Canada to Cuba and from Georgia to California."

"When coupled with practical work in local stations, the courses are particularly valuable to those interested in the commercial aspects of radio or those preparing for government positions. Equal attention will be given, however, to the ever growing group of amateurs whose intelligent study of both theory and practice guarantees the permanence of this new factor in modern life."

Correspondence instruction from the department may be supplemented by lectures on outstanding problems of radio transmission and reception, a feature unique in the history of correspondence instruction.

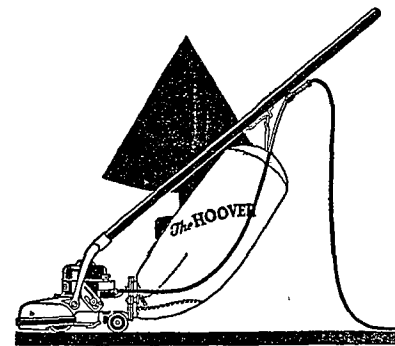
